

TRUCK, BUS BILL IS DENOUNCED AT MEETING THURSDAY

The fight to nullify the recently passed truck and bus law, effects of which it is claimed will be to take away from 10,000 trucks off the highway of Oregon, will be carried to the supreme court of Oregon if necessary, J. W. Smith, representative of the truck owners and farmers protective association of Marion county, told the large county association at a meeting at the chamber of commerce Thursday evening.

Outlining the steps taken in the fight to date, Smith said that one objection had been filed, another is ready to file and that it is possible to knock the law out of the statute books of the state.

Several speakers denounced the law as unjust, illegal and the tool of the railroads and large allied truck owners and merchants. The law was sponsored by the Lane county truck owners and farmers protective association, with A. R. Bunker, of Corvallis, president.

Walter H. Kline, of Corvallis, argued against truck owners going beyond legal bounds in fighting the law, urging them to obey the law, American citizens. The law goes into effect July 1 and many truck owners have threatened open defiance of the statute.

The plan to block provisions of the law was for farmers to obtain permits and haul their produce on the highways, blocking them to traffic necessary, in order to circumvent the law.

J. C. Bunker, of Corvallis, another speaker against the bill, declared that he had been enacted through the influence of common carrier interests and said the law strikes at every part of a truck, carrier or delivery.

relative to his deep interest in the development of a close understanding and mutual faith between our countries. I remarked that I had come to the Far East in the hope of being better able, as a journalist, to contribute to this objective. He nodded in smiling approval and began his next remark, relative to my visit to Manchoukuo without awaiting the interpreter's translation.

As we left, I was given a copy of the latest imperial rescript, in which the emperor said:

"The advancement of international peace is what, as evermore, we desire and our attitude towards enterprises of peace shall sustain no change. By quitting the League of Nations and embarking on a course of its own, our empire does not mean that it will stand aloof in the extreme, nor that it will isolate itself thereby from the fraternity of nations."

"It is our desire to promote mutual confidence between our empire and all other powers and make known the justice of its cause through the world."

Interests Held Mutual

After leaving the palace, I visited the veteran Count Uchida at the foreign office.

Recounting to Count Uchida the emperor's expression of his interest in Japanese-American relations. I inquired about the government's opinion on what the present and future appear to offer in this direction.

"Japan and the United States owe it to the world and to posterity to keep the Pacific peace to its name," the minister replied. "We are convinced of the absolutely vital need of Japanese-American amity and good will for the promotion of Far Eastern peace. There is no question between the two countries capable of disturbing their good relations."

"Moreover, in the matter of trade, the two countries are bound by mutual interest that cannot be severed without disaster to both. Japan is your best customer in the whole orient, while the United States is our best customer anywhere. I believe this economic bond, which will grow stronger as its importance is better understood, will be interpreted as American trade in Manchoukuo expands, as it will in the near future."

"Japan has and will continue to observe scrupulously the principles of the open door and equal opportunity in Manchoukuo and China. The United States need have no fears on this score. The fact is that the trade of

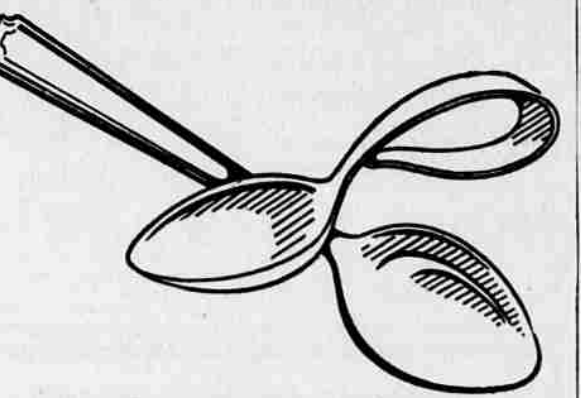
