Grains Advance Again Saturday

CHICAGO, June 24.—(P)—Enthusiasm for higher prices blazed furiously in all the speculative pits on the Board of Trade today, with wheat soaring a maximum of 3 1/2 cents.

May wheat, in which trading formally commenced Monday crossed to above 90 cents today. Persistent abnormally hot temperatures and dearth of adequate moisture brought in new floods of sensational crop damage suggesting that United States grain yields this season would prove the smallest in 30 years.

Official advices indicated that Nebraska small grains were beyond redemption. Wheat closed hurried, 2@2 7/8 above yesterday's finish, corn 1@1 1/4 up, oats 2 1/2@2 3/4 advanced, and provisions at a rise of 5 to 20 cents.
