

Eugene Townies To Clash With Schapps At Fairgrounds Here Sunday

LOCAL TEAM STILL SUFFERS BY LOSS OF GOOD PLAYERS

The Eugene Townies will clash with Schapps of Portland, in the Oregon State league, at the fairgrounds Sunday afternoon at 2:30. Schapps already hold one win over the Townies, and Skipper Reinhardt hopes to even the account with them. Although the Eugene forces are not at their full strength and will not be until the boys return from National Guard camp, Manager Reinhardt is endeavoring to assemble a formidable crew.

Charlie Wirth, flashy infielder, will again be seen at short stop. For several years, Wirth has played second base, but is giving a very creditable account of himself at short. At the present time his hitting has been away below par, however, this will undoubtedly be raised before very long. Allan Scott, a newcomer from Sacramento will probably be used at Wirth's old post, at second base. Third base will be taken care of by Freddie Seese, or Wright, a former Springfield boy now residing at Wendling. Wright played third base for Oregon Normal and gave a very creditable account of himself during the spring. Last year he played very good ball for the team sponsored by the Heilig.

The outfield is what is bothering the Townies manager at the present time. Inman and Wiltshire will take care of the pitching assignment, with Dick Bishop at the receiving end.

Schapps will present themselves with an excellent line-up. One of their outstanding players, both in basketball and baseball, is Chief McLean, an Indian. McLean was one of Howard Hobson's main stays both in basketball and baseball, and Reinhardt would like to have him attend the University of Oregon, where his credits in such shape that he could be used. McLean is probably one of the most outstanding athletes turned out of the Portland high schools in recent years. Heiller will probably be used in the pitching assignment, against the Townies, with Turple, a Portland dentist, receiving. Turple has played here off and on for the past three years, and is pretty well acquainted with a good many of the Eugene dentists.

Other games of the state league will be played at Albany where the Alcos will meet the Bend team and at Salem where the Senators entertain the Portland Federals.

Jensen, on the other hand, has legs like a camel and a chest like a homing pigeon. He was defeated recently in a "beauty" contest by Bull- dog Jackson of Klamath Falls, the ultimate in humiliation. Thor, however, is very strong and fast and is a demon when it comes to wrestling and is expected to make something of the time.

High Class Pitching Puts Giants At Top of National

NEW YORK, June 24.—(AP)—The only group of sports selectors more adept at achieving haywire than the boxing experts are the baseball experts. Whereas the boxing experts pick but one lemon at a time, the baseball experts, having a wider range, often pick an entire lemon tree.

The boys are in magnificent form this year and promise to equal the feat of their 1881 brothers who missed all sixteen teams. You have only to cast your eyes on the standings in the National league for proof of that. In the National today New York is on top, followed by St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Chicago, Brooklyn, Boston, Cincinnati and Philadelphia. If three months ago you had told a baseball expert June 24 would find the clubs in that order, he would have smacked you over the head with the ten bundles of statistics he had gathered to make an opposite guess.

And he would have been entirely in his rights, too, for none of the "infallible" facts used in picking baseball winners—pitching, fielding and batting averages, St. Louis temperature, beer capacity, of players, and average age of umpiring staff—pointed toward the Giants being on top longer than April 12.

Speaking of the Giants, we are a bit puzzled at our colleagues' inability to fathom out why the young men of Manhattan are leading the league. We have read dozens of stories

wherein the readers are asked to please write in and tell what's holding the Giants up. To us it's very clear. The Giants have been making more runs than the opposition, which, if we aren't thinking of field hockey, is the basic idea of the game. How the Giants accomplished this is just as simple. First Schumacher goes out and pitches a shut-out. Then Fitzsimmons goes out and pitches a shut-out. After Fitzsimmons, Hubbell pitches a shut-out. By that time it's Schumacher's time again. Absolutely elemental.

If my colleagues must have a mystery, please let them worry about what enabled Terry to convert a second-rate pitching staff into a bunch of Matthews, Waddells, Groves and Johnsons. That's the real problem. This time last year Schumacher, while he could throw everything in the book, wasn't accurate enough to hit a 24-foot beer sign at three paces. Parmelee was the same, only worse.

Strangely enough, this amazing form of the Giants, which normally could be expected to fan the interest of the fans into a blaze, is costing them money. Nobody goes out to see them play. On top of the league, and going along like a five-alarm fire! They're playing in what amounts to strict privacy. This state of affairs cannot be pushed off on the depression, for last year when money matters were worse and the Giants were floundering about in the cellar, the paying customers were thrice as plentiful.

Quiet Briton Wins Amateur British Title

HOYLAKE, Eng., June 24.—(AP)—The honorable Michael Scott, at 55 the oldest player ever to win the British amateur golf championship, maintained the traditional uncertainty of this sporting classic by decisively beating Thomas A. Bourn, a 30-year-old country man, today, 4 and 3, in the 36-hole final match.

Scott was a champion of Australia when Bourn was a babe in arms. He never had advanced beyond the semi-finals before and that happened a dozen years ago. The experts figured he should have been beaten by any of the youngsters he trounced this week, certainly by George T. Dunlap, Jr., of New York, the brilliant American youth, who fell before the veteran in yesterday's semi-finals.

But Scott refused to be beaten, even though he surprised himself, his friends, and his opponents. Quiet and dignified, in fact introducing something of the austere atmosphere of the house of lords to the Royal Liverpool links, Scott played carefully and slowly all week. His correct and quiet faultless style was rewarded by a triumph such as no man his age ever achieved before. Away back in 1902, Charles Hutchings, at 53, won the amateur crown.

And it was Sharkey who met pale faced Carnera, coming back into the room to see if there was something he could do, now he was a sear and an oath that the huge Italian stumbling away in great colossal dog that had been whipped by its master.

"When the time comes," said Sharkey, blind with rage, "I'll care of that guy for Brak."

So the time comes Thursday and Carnera will face a champion more venomous than at any time in his career that has run from the risks in fighting to the sublime. A nature of the moon and fancies become sometimes either in victory or defeat but always possessed of a backbone of superb skill and punching power.

Sharkey at times against Harry W. Jimmy Maloney, Jack Dempsey, Schmeling, Tommy Loughran, and the first fight with Carnera who knocked him down and who easily 15 rounds, was as great a weight as the modern ring has seen.
