

MORE WOODSMEN TO BE SENT OUT TO C. C. C. CAMP

A call for 105 more men of the woodsmen's quota for F-30 camp of the Civilian Conservation Corps on Smith river was received at the office of R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the Sitka national forest, Monday, and the men will be sent out as fast as they are gathered together. This will make a total of 130 woodsmen at this camp. These with a detachment of 25 boys from Missouri sent there recently, make a force of over 150 in this camp.

The men to be sent to the camp in response to this call will come from Lane, Polk, Lincoln, Benton and Yamhill counties, 60 being sent from Lane county. The men will be chosen from those enrolled a short time ago at the court house.

Forty-eight new forest service trucks were delivered to the eight camps in the Willamette forest over the week-end, according to P. A. Thompson, supervisor of this forest. He and C. C. Olsen, construction superintendent in the forest, piloted the convoy of trucks from Vancouver Barracks over the week-end and dropped them off at the several camps in the district.

Work has been started on a bridge to be 85 feet long to cross the upper Willamette river in the vicinity of Ridge camp on the new Hills peak road. It was announced at the office of Supervisor Thompson.

DOLLAR WHEAT STORY

who has grain to sell—although many farmers looked at the price surge forlornly as their crops have been destroyed by heat and wind. Dollar wheat was recorded on the Fort Worth market.

Cotton was the leader in New York commodity trading, advancing \$4.10 to \$4.25 a bale. Every delivery passed the 10 cents per pound level with May delivery reaching 11.12 cents per pound.

Provisions Follow
Cash cotton also behaved spectacularly, jumping \$4.25 a bale to the highest peak in two years.

Sugar advanced 2 to 3 points; lard was up 22 to 33 points; cocoa was up 18 to 20 points; hides advanced 35 to 45 points and rubber was 22 to 20 points higher.

That bullishness was reflected in the index level of 30 cash prices compiled by Dunn and Bradstreet, Inc., for the United Press which stood at 97.84 per cent of the 1930-32 average, the highest point in more than two years. The index was 94.87 per cent Saturday.

FLOUR ADVANCES

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—Sensational rises were forced today in all North American wheat markets. On the Portland futures market all new high points were reached for the season in July, September and December with rises of 6 1/2 bushel in each during the day. Sales included 1000 bushel July, 17,000 bushel Sept. and 12,000 Dec.

On the Portland merchants' exchange cash wheat gained 7c for local and 8c bushel for Montana spring and winter.

Advances of 10c bbl. in the price of patent flour and 20c average in bakers was announced with a future rise of a dime scheduled for tomorrow in local patent and more promised if the price of wheat holds. Heavy sales of flour were confirmed for the east but no export business of importance was shown.

CHINA BUYS WHEAT

SEATTLE, June 26.—(AP)—Five million bushels of wheat will be loaded here for the orient, the Seattle port commission announced today as a result of a contract entered into with the newly organized Continental Pacific Grain corporation.

Full cargoes for 20 8000-ton ships will be involved, the commission said in making public the deal.

The wheat is part of 12,500,000 bushels sold by the U. S. government to China, the commission said.

Cost of Living Goes Up in May

NEW YORK, June 26.—(AP)—The cost of living for wage earners increased 0.8 per cent in May, marking the first monthly rise since September, 1930, according to the compilation issued today by the national industrial conference board. The rise in the index, as compared with April, was almost entirely the result of an extra-seasonal upturn in food prices, the report said.
