BROWNSVILLE, June 27.—(Special)—Mrs. Mary Overton, 90, the last surviving pioneer woman in this community who crossed the plains to Oregon in the year 1851, died at her home here Thursday, June 22. Her funeral was held at the Christian church Sunday, Rev. Eldon Wood, her former pastor, conducting the ceremony. Interment was in the historic Union Point cemetery.
Mrs. Overton was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Keeney who crossed the plains from the middle west to settle on the edge of the hills near Union Point. She was the widow of George Overton and is survived by many relatives including a sister, Mrs. A. Wile, three sons, eight grand children and eight great grandchildren. The sons are Schuyler L. Overton, of Sweet Home and Fred C. and G. Albert Overton, both of Brownsville.

Joseph B. Freeman
Joseph B. Freeman died suddenly at his home in Lowell Monday evening at 7 o'clock.
He was born in Michigan, July 18, 1875. He was married in that state when 21 years of age, to Myrtle McDonald. They came to Oregon in 1903, living at Coburg, Eugene, Halsey, Mill City, and Lowell.
Mr. Freeman is survived by his widow, Mrs. Myrtle Freeman; two daughters, Mrs. Otto Alford of Eugene and Reo Freeman at home; three grandchildren; and three brothers and two sisters, all living in Michigan. He was a member of the Lowell Bible Standard church.
