

Sharkey And Carnera Taper Off On Training

SAILOR JACK IN GOOD CONDITION FOR COMING BOUT

NEW YORK, June 27.—(AP)—Primo Carnera may expect to catch Jack Sharkey out of condition when they step into the ring of Madison Square Garden's Long Island city bowl Thursday night but if he does, he'll run into an unpleasant surprise.

Jack, at 30, won't be the Sharkey of a few years ago perhaps but he'll be in first-class shape just the same, trained to the minute and ready for the long 15-round route.

An examination by Dr. Vincent Nardello, of the medical staff of the New York state athletic commission, effectively disposed of the question of the champion's condition.

"Sharkey is in better shape physically and mentally," Dr. Nardello said, "than he was when I examined him a year ago for his fight with Max Schmeling. His disposition is greatly improved. He was too much on edge last year, too nervous. Nervous exhaustion is more tiring than any amount of physical effort. I would say Sharkey is very fit as ready as Carnera."

Sharkey, as a matter of fact, never has looked better than he did yesterday in a sizzling two-round workout with Hans Rikie, rugged German warrior, at his training camp in Oronburg, N. Y. The champion was punching viciously to the body with his right hand, snaking punches home with lightning speed, and twice shook up Rikie with left hooks that traveled only inches.

Carnera, meanwhile, wound up his intensive preparations at Pompton Lakes, N. J., by boxing three rounds with Harold Mays and two against Arthur Huttick. Both found the huge Italian easy to hit but hard to hurt. Comment boxing critics expressed surprise over Primo's improvement, especially in boxing skill.

Carnera plans no more boxing and will take only enough exercise until the night of the fight to keep himself at top condition. Sharkey expected to wind up boxing today.

Although there was no accurate estimate on advance sales, boxing writers began scaling down their optimistic predictions of a crowd of 60,000 and receipts of \$350,000. Business at the Garden box office was slow and some observers expressed the belief the gate might not be much in excess of the \$240,000 Jack Dempsey drew with his Max Baer-Max Schmeling battle although he charged \$10 "tops" against \$15 for Thursday's match.

The betting odds continued to favor Sharkey at 6 to 5.

SENATORS IN LEAD OVER N. Y. YANKS

While the Washington Senators have been hitting the ball to all corners of western ball parks in their march to the top of the American league, Manager Joe Cronin's pitchers also have been playing an important role in establishing a season's major league record for consecutive victories.

With a 4 to 3 triumph over the Cleveland Indians yesterday, the Senators not only increased their lead to two full games over the Indians but won their eighth successive game and their 15th in 16 starts.

In yesterday's conquest, the third over the Indians, Alvin Crowder and Jack Russell held the tribe in check in all except the second inning. Oral Hildebrand, ace of the Cleveland mound staff and Willis Hudlin threatened the Senators attack except in the second inning, when Joe Kuhel blasted out a home run with Fred Schulte on base, and in the eighth when Goose Goslin's triple and singles by Cronin and Bluege gave the leaders two more runs.

The Athletics got to an early lead against the White Sox and then with Jim Peterson pitching effective relief put pounded out an 8 to 2 victory.

With Dusty Rhodes keeping the Browns nine hits well scattered and pounding out four hits, including a pair of doubles, the Boston Red Sox defeated St. Louis 13 to 5.

The Yankees and Tigers failed to get into action when rain intervened while all of the games in the national league were washed out.

RYDER CUP MATCH WON BY BRITISHERS

SOUTHPORT, Eng., June 27.—(AP)—Great Britain today regained the Ryder cup, symbolic of professional golfing supremacy in the United States and England.

This was the "rubber" match in the series played bi-annually. Each nation had twice won the cup, and in every case the host nation was the winner. America won at Scioto country club, Columbus, O., in 1931.

The lead in the series of matches changed repeatedly as the two teams finished today.

The aggregate score was tied at 5 1-2 to 5 1-2 when Denmore Shute, slim American, was finishing his match with Syd Easterbrook stocky young English pro.

Easterbrook won the match, one up, to make the final score Great Britain 6 1-2, United States 5 1-2.

AMERICANS FACE CANADIAN GOLFERS

VICTORIA, B. C., June 27.—(AP)—Sharp shooting American golfers from south of the international border, led by Albert (Scotty) Campbell, youthful medalist winner of Seattle, faced Canadian opponents for the most part today as match play opened in the Pacific northwest amateur golf tourney.

Campbell, Seattle city champion and runner-up at the national public links tournament last year, who shot a 71-69-140 card yesterday to win medal honors from the 35 other entries, faced Dr. T. C. Sedden, of Spokane, as one of the exceptions. Dr. Sedden's card yesterday was 80-76-176.

On the other hand, Lee Stiel, of Seattle, whose 69-72-141 was second best in the opening round, Chandler (Chan) Egan, defending champion of Medford, Ore., who was third with a 73-71-144; Dr. O. F. Willing, of Portland, who was in eighth place yesterday with a 75-74-149 but still remains a favorite, and others from over the line had Canadian opposition.

In the women's tourney, Mrs. Vera Hutchings, of Vancouver, defending champion, romped off with medalist honors yesterday, but she was held pressed by Portland opposition. Her score of 85 was only one stroke better than the 86 carded by Miss M. McDougall, of Portland, and Miss Jean Plageman, also of Portland, was fourth with an 88.

PORTLAND RETURNS HOME TO ENGAGE OAKLAND TUESDAY

Nearing the halfway mark today, the 1933 Coast league pennant race was largely a matter of Sacramento against the field, with the high-flying Senators four games ahead of Portland and six games ahead of the third-place Hollywood Stars.

The Solons open their first series of the season at Seattle tonight with a record of 21 victories in their last 29 starts. Since June 1 Earl McNeely's clouters have climbed from fourth to first place.

Portland returns home today after a three weeks road trip, climaxed by a 5-2 series victory at Seattle last week. The Beavers oppose the Oaks, still shaken from their shellacking at Sacramento. The Oaks have been slipping since they lost the league leadership at the end of April. The first half of the season for Portland will be played tonight when Oscar Eckhardt, Mission outfielder and long the leading hitter of the Pacific Coast league, saw his advantage further reduced today with the circuit going into the half way mark of the season.

Eckhardt, despite something of a slump, continued to be the only player in the league, however, who was over the four hundred mark, with a .422 average for 84 games.

The Mission club, with hitters in first, third and fourth places in the individual standings, was unable to hold first place in the team averages as Sacramento moved up with a collective mark of .318 to .317 for Mission.

Ray Jacobs, Hollywood first baseman, was eight circuit wallops ahead of George Brown, Seattle first sacker, as home run king, with a total of 25 to his credit. Fred Haney, Hollywood veteran third baseman, who has been running wild on the bases, boosted his thefts to 21, three ahead of Augie Galan, San Francisco shortstop.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—Bulldog Jackson of Klamath Falls won the main event of last night's wrestling matches here from Otis Clingman of Oklahoma City, but only after losing the last of four falls.

Jackson took the first fall with a hammerlock in 17 minutes. Clingman evened it up 14 minutes later with a flying Dutchman and a pin hold.

In the third fall, Art O'Reilly of Eugene first awarded the tumble to Clingman, then reversed his decision and declared that Jackson won in 8 minutes with a Boston crab hold.

Because of objections raised to the reversed decision, Promoter Herb Owen asked the two to return for another fall. Clingman was awarded this split in 3 minutes in a foul. But boxing commissioners, who also govern wrestling here, said the referee's decision awarding Jackson the third fall was final. Jackson weighed 158 and Logger Hiebert, 160, St. Helens, won the semi-windup from But Stastny, 102, Seattle, when Stastny was unable to return after Hiebert won the second fall. Stastny won the first.

The opener went to Jess McCann, 143, Portland, who took two out of three falls from Art O'Reilly, 130, the Eugene wrestler who refereed the final event.

BUTTER MARKET SHOWS STEADIER

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—The increasing steadiness of the butter trade both on the open market and on the exchange, reflects not only the somewhat better demand all through the territory, but the decreasing output. Churning at practically all domestic points is showing quite a liberal decrease for the last week, but advance curtailing the supply at practically all centers.

The advance of 1-2 lb. in the price on prime first cubes during the late session of the produce exchange was simply following what had already occurred upon the open market. There was an advance of a like sum in firsts at the previous session, indicating that the public was chiefly seeking the undergrades.

There was no change in the butter-fair market.

Market for eggs is generally without change locally. Values continue mixed with both high and low priced sellers claiming the other fellow is doing the cutting.

Recent slight betterment in the price on live Leghorn broiler chickens indicates that the previous sharp cut was made to keep supplies from arriving. Late receipts have been limited.

Market for country killed meats was generally unchanged for the day. Receipts have not been heavy and while a slight overnight carryover is suggested, sales are being made generally within the price spread.

With a rather fair supply in sight and with little home canning reported, prices on strawberries were reduced sharply during the day, but berries are also lower with a slight cut also in currants.

Wheat Continues Rapid Advances

CHICAGO, June 27.—(AP)—Alter-nate wild advances and setbacks swept wheat up more than 6 cents today above yesterday's 7 3-8 cents gain and at times took about 2 cents off the maximum.

At the extreme top figures today, wheat showed a rise of about 21 cents over last week's low, and more than 32 cents since the beginning of the season. Indications of showers over part of the wheat belt giving promise of at least a little relief from drought and destructive high temperatures were largely responsible for huge profit taking operations and for temporary downturns from maximum prices, but highest prices of the day were reached in the final quarter of an hour.

Just before the closing gong, wheat showed 7 3-8 cents addition to exactly an equal rise yesterday. May wheat today touched a pinnacle of \$1.06 3-8.

Wheat closed excited, at somewhat below new top figures, but 5 3-4 to 6 3-8 above yesterday's finish, corn 3 to 3 7-8 up, oats 2 to 3 cents advanced and provisions at a rise of 5 to 30 cents.
