Veteran's 3-C Camp To Be Established In This District

Twenty forestry camps are now completely established in the Eugene district and one veteran's camp will be established at the Eugene headquarters. The camp is to be manned completely by veterans and will be located at Wolf Creek below Roseburg.

When final enrollments in the C. O. C. have been made in the United States, the total membership will be 301,767, distributed as follows:

240,000 young men, unmarried, between 18 and 25, with dependents, 34,375 experienced foresters.

2200 veterans recruiting from the bonus marchers.

25,000 veterans, 7 per cent of whom may be Spanish veterans.

Because of the density and number of forests, the ninth corps area, including Oregon, commanded by Major General Malin Craig, has established approximately half the total of all the work camps established in the other eight corps areas.

Relative standing of corps areas in respect to number of forest work camps established is as follows:

Ninth corps area 459, Fourth corps area 198, Seventh corps area 154, Third corps area 147, Sixth corps area 139, Eighth corps area 130, First corps area 91, Fifth corps area 78, Second corps area 43.

The spotting of the 459 ninth corps area camps entailed considerable reconnaissance, survey, and inspection work, and was accomplished with the care, thoroughness, and attention to details of drainage, sanitation, and hygiene that the army always brings to the selection of its camp sites, whether they are to be "one night stands" or of six months' duration.

DR. RICHMOND IS SPEAKER ON FLAG

Dr. J. E. Richmond, well known in this section for his interest in flags and for the talks he gives on them, was the speaker for the Rotary club's weekly luncheon Tuesday noon, discussing the American flag for the club's Fourth of July program.

Dr. Richmond presented all the flags relevant to the development of the American flag, including the Spanish, the French, the Swedish, the English, the Pine Tree flag of the Puritans, the English East Indies flag adopted by Washington in the early revolutionary period, and finally the first Stars and Stripes made by Betsy Ross. This first Stars and Stripes had the 13 stars in a circle. Later, Dr. Richmond showed in his history, two more stars and two more stripes were adopted. Finally, in 1818, the present style of flag with the 13 stripes and the star for each state was formed.

Following up this flag, Dr. Richmond showed the Divided flag suggested at the time of the Civil war; also the flag of the Confederacy, the flag of the Louisiana territory; the flag of the Spanish claims; the flag used by the companies in Alaska first; and the flag adopted later for the Alaskan territory.

"Y" CAMP FOR BOYS TO BEGIN JULY 16

Registration is now open for Camp Greenhill, the boys' summer camp conducted by the Eugene Y. M. C. A. on Binnewater lake, six miles north of Florence.

Many boys have already signed up for the camp of two weeks period, to be held July 16 to 29. The maximum attendance will be 24 boys, due to the lack of equipment and finance.

The site on Lake Binnewater is ideal for a boys' summer camp. Swimming, boating, canoeing, fishing, hiking and trips to the coast will be available to the campers. The camp will be conducted very informally, the purpose being to give the boys an opportunity of acquainting themselves with nature and to build up their strength and energy for coming school days.

The leadership will be as follows: Dick Strite, who has conducted boys' summer camps in Washington and New York states will act as camp director. Eara Blehm of Harrisburg will act as leader and specialize in social activities. Wendell Harmon, a graduate of Iowa State college and for many years leader in the DeMolais, Ia. Y. M. C. A. camp, will act as leader specializing in nature lore. Several other leaders will be chosen later as the need requires.

Dick Strite, Vernon Hoffman and James Anderson will leave shortly after July 4 to set up camp. Ernest Etaley, boys' secretary at the Y, is in charge of camp promotion and all interested are asked to communicate with him.

**S. P. Moves to
Make Drastic
Cut in Fares**

Permission to reduce fares 45 per cent for coach and tourist sleeper travel between all stations on its Pacific lines has been requested by the Southern Pacific company in applications to the interstate commerce commission and various state commissions. It was announced here on Tuesday.

The proposed tariff would establish a basic one-way rate of two cents a mile for such transportation, as compared with the present first-class rate of 3.6 cents a mile, and with approval will be made effective July 1, according to Felix S. McGinnis, vice-president in charge of system passenger traffic.

As now planned, it was stated, the low-fare program provides for a 90-day experimental period, at the end of which it will be made permanent if patronage warrants such action. The territory which would be benefited by the lowering of travel costs includes six western states, served by Southern Pacific's lines from San Francisco to Ogden and from Portland to El Paso.

Information on the home preparation of raw wool for making bedding may be obtained free at the office of Miss Gertrude Skow, home demonstration agent, it was announced on Tuesday. The information is contained in a leaflet prepared for Lane county distribution.

The leaflet gives methods of scouring and carding wool for quilts, comforters and mattresses and affords an economical use for wool which cannot be sold profitably, Miss Skow said.
