

Thor Jensen To Meet Cohen In Armory Go

OTIS CLINGMAN TO MEET NEMANIC IN 45-MINUTE EVENT

Johnny Cohen, sensational New York City grappler, will meet the toughest opponent since he opened his western tour when he mixes with Thor Jensen, of Elkton, in the main event on tonight's wrestling program at the armory.

Cohen claims an unbroken string of victories since he arrived on the Pacific coast and his unexpected win over Harold "True Blue" Hiebert in the armory last week gave credence to his claims.

Cohen is said to be the prettiest built grappler in the business and when he is dished in the ring last week he drew a burst of appreciation from the audience. Unlike many "strong men," however, Cohen is not muscle bound and he gets around the ring with the lissiveness of a black panther.

Tickets Go Fast

Cohen's match with Jensen has attracted widespread attention and the advance ticket sale points to a packed house. Cohen's published remarks about Thor have not been well received by the Elkton boy and good, old fashioned fireworks are promised.

Otis Clingman, of Oklahoma City, will meet John Nemanic, of St. Louis, in the 45-minute special event. Herb Owen, promoter, says this is a real main event match but because Nemanic is not known here Owen is presenting him in a 45-minute match so the fans can look him over and decide for themselves.

The card will open at 8:30 o'clock.

WASHINGTON KEEPS LEAGUE LEADERSHIP

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—Washington retained its one-game American league lead over New York by defeating Cleveland, 15 to 2, after a nine-run rally in the first frame.

The Yankees kept pace with Washington by downing Detroit, 10 to 7, after a three-run spurt in the fifth. Babe Ruth made his 17th homer with two aboard for New York. Jimmy Fox of Philadelphia took the home-run leadership by driving out his 18th as the Athletics bowed to Chicago, 9 to 8, enabling the Chicks to replace Cleveland at fourth position.

Boston at St. Louis was called at the end of the fourth because of rain. The Red Sox were leading 3 to 2.

Gus Mancuso's 10-inning homer with two aboard gave the Giants a 7-to-4 win in the nightcap after the Pirates had taken the opener, 5 to 2, by virtue of three runs in the eighth.

St. Louis succumbed to Boston, 4 to 3, when Buck Jordan's ninth-inning single with two aboard drove in two runs and the Cards also lost the nightcap, 3 to 0, when Fred Frankhouse held them to three hits. Brooklyn and Cincinnati split a doubleheader, the Reds winning the first contest, 8 to 1, behind Paul Derringer's six-hit flinging, but the Dodgers took the second, 6 to 5, after Gus Stripp drove in two runs in the eighth by singling with the bases loaded.

Chicago took two games from the Phillies, 9 to 5, and 8 to 3.

Six-Day Bicycle Rider Dies in Race

PASSAIC, N. J., June 29.—(AP)—President De Lille, six-day bicycle racer, collapsed and died late last night soon after finishing a two-mile tandem race at the Velodrome, Nutley. He was 23 years old.

While motoring to his home at Paterson, he suddenly fell unconscious. His companions brought him to a hospital here. Physicians pronounced him dead of a heart attack.

VINES VICTOR

COOP GOES TO QUARTER FINALS

VICTORIA, B. C., June 29.—(AP)—The "old maestro" of northwest golf, H. Chandler Egan, Medford, Ore., continued his march for his sixth title by an overwhelming 18 and 14 victory over Desmond Taylor, Victoria, to reach the quarter finals of the Pacific northwest amateur golf tournament.

Egan's steady playing over the wet course contrasted Taylor's erratic shooting amid downpours. Egan was 12 up at the turn.

Albert (Scotty) Campbell, sensational Seattle medalist, gained the quarter finals by defeating Jimmie Todd, Victoria, 4 and 3.

Yesterday's feature match was the victory of Olan Taylor, Victoria, over Dr. Cliff Baker of Kalama, Wash. Baker held a five-hole advantage at the turn. But Taylor whittled away the lead, winning from the doctor on the 38th hole.

Baker made a fine bid for victory with a 25-foot putt, but was below the hole and Taylor canned an eight-footer for a birdie to win 2 up.

Dr. O. F. Willing, Portland Walker cup player, took a one-sided match from Jack Matson, Victoria, 7 and 6. Kenny Baker, British Columbia open and amateur champion, defeated R. Scott Moncreiff of Victoria 8 and 7.

Johnnie Shields, Seattle, took the measure of Ken Lawson, Victoria, 7 and 6, while Lee Stell, Seattle, came through to victory over J. H. Willson, Victoria, 10 and 8. C. W. Reid of Victoria dropped a 2 and 1 match to Jack Murphy of Seattle.

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—We were offered \$100 by Ed Wynn for our selection in tonight's fight, which is his price for us, but our motto being what it is—"our constituents first and last with Sheridan twenty miles away"—we refused.

Our choice, as usual, will go to the best, intelligent, if small circle we call our constituency. If you would care to join our happy group, with its little privilege of exchanging letters, all you have to do is send five muskrat pelts and a letter from your pastor.

Sharkey is our choice. Sharkey by a knockout in one minute and 27 seconds of the seventh round. The knockout punch will be a right hand to the profile, delivered immediately after Cornelia has finished taking a count of nine from a left hook to the Van Dyke.

While we are about it, we might just as well predict the entire business. SHARKEY-CARNERA ODDS EVEN IN 15 ROUND TITLE MIX

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—Jack Sharkey, the temperamental ex-sailor from Boston, will defend his heavyweight championship of the world against Italy's "man mountain," Primo Carnera, in a 15-round bout at Madison Square Garden's big battle bowl on Long Island tonight.

Under the stimulus of hot weather and the impetus given by the fast revival by the successful Max Baer-Max Schmeling scrap three weeks ago, a crowd of some 60,000 is expected to cram the bowl and pour more than \$250,000 into the coffers of the Garden and of the milk fund, which shares in the receipts.

The disparity in the sizes of the contestants; Carnera's undoubtedly great improvement since the Boston Gob handed him an artistic lacing at Elmhurst field two years ago; Sharkey's temperament, which has betrayed him into costly mistakes in previous bouts, gave the meeting a flock of "ringside" which still had the faithful jittering around in search of a favorite today.

Sharkey started out with an edge in the betting, but the confidence of Carnera's backers pounded the odds down until to the fans were faced with the unusual situation of having a champion rated at no better than even money against the challenger.

Carnera, the biggest man ever to fight for the world's title, was expected to tip the scales at 260, just 65 pounds more than the champion, at the official weighing-in at the offices of the New York State athletic commission at 1 p. m. (E. S. T.) today.

Despite his great bulk and his six feet, 7 inches of height, the "Vast Venetian" is fast and a clever boxer, lacking only a real knockout punch. He has a quick and accurate left jab and moves with surprising lightness on his oversize feet. He is, however, shy on ring generalship and unable to cope with sudden shifts in attacking style.

Sharkey, in perfect condition, has displayed everything he needs to defend the crown in his workouts, speed, snap, confidence and a venomous punching power that has worked havoc among his sparring partners. In addition there is the tragic "angle" of Ernie Schauf's death a few days after he was knocked out by Carnera last winter. Although the medical evidence revealed that Carnera's jab had little or nothing to do with Schauf's death, it gave him a reputation as a "killer" and it gave Sharkey, Schauf's stablemate, an incentive to do his best tonight.

The Bostonian's age, 31 years, also seems to have weighed against him in the minds of the faithful although the ring's records show a dozen or more heavyweights who had just reached their fighting prime at that age. Sharkey, a careful lawyer, proud of his reputation as a "family man," and trained to the minute for the bout should not be troubled by the weight of his years.

Weather predictions indicated the possibility of showers today but there is little likelihood of a postponement unless a heavy rain develops. The first preliminary is scheduled for 7 p. m. (E. S. T.) with the main event going on between 8:30 and 9 p. m. or earlier if the weather becomes threatening. There will be no broadcast.

Brownsville Tennis Court Torn Down

BROWNVILLE, June 29.—(Special)—Considerable indignation was registered among tennis enthusiasts and all lovers of outdoor recreation when the municipal tennis court was, without authority from the city council, torn down in order to make more room for a carnival company at the pioneer picnic last week.

At the insistence of the tennis association here and probably with the sanction of the city council, it is believed that the pioneer picnic board will restore the tennis court, in spite of the damage done.
