Lane and Lincoln Woodsmen Sent Out
Twenty-four woodsmen from Lincoln county and nine from Lane county will leave Eugene Friday morning for Medford where they will be assigned to different C C C camps in that district. The men were given their physical examination by army men Thursday and if any are found to be unfit for the work their places will be filled by men from the Lane county quota. The men will be quartered in the camp back of the butte Friday night and transportation furnished them to Medford.

Fifteen woodsmen left Thursday for the Smith river, being taken in by truck, according to R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest. This will complete the quota of woodsmen for this camp.

No Towing Needed On Florence Road
The new highway leading from the North Fork road into Florence is now in such condition that cars can drive over it without being towed, according to William Kyle, Jr., merchant of Florence.
For some time the highway contractors had a tractor ready at that point to tow cars through the sand but now the grade is covered with clay so as to give traction and no towing is necessary.
This information is given to those who contemplate driving to the coast over the holidays. There is no difficulty at all in getting over this short section of the new highway, Mr. Kyle says.

Six Planets Line Up in Single File in Western Heavens
Six of the major planets of the heavens line up in almost perfect single-file style in the early evening this month and observers who look in the western skies may see this striking phenomenon, according to J. Hugh Pruett, astronomer of the extension division of the university.
At about 9 o'clock each evening, the two planets Mars and Jupiter, which recently appeared in conjunction, may be seen high in the southwest sky above the horizon. Venus and Mercury may be seen on a direct line with the other two planets, but near the horizon to the northwest.
Two other planets, Neptune and Pluto also are on a line with the other four, but can not be seen without the aid of a telescope because of their great distance from the earth.
A straight line drawn from Mars to Venus would intersect all the planets, an unusual condition, according to Pruett.
"Venus and Mercury have appeared in the evening sky just recently," says the astronomer. "They have been behind the sun after having disappeared from the morning sky. Venus will get higher and brighter as it comes nearer to us and will be in the evening sky all the rest of this year. It always outlines everything else in the way of stars and planets and is about the size of the earth."
"Mercury is interesting in that it is the smallest of the regular planets and travels on the orbit nearest the sun. For that reason it is seldom seen by earth inhabitants. This planet will be at the highest point above the horizon on July 2, and will then move back toward the sun, passing Venus on July 12 and soon after that becoming lost in the rays of the sun. We have therefore, an unusual opportunity to see this little planet around 9 o'clock."


