Fazalene

1 package noodles boiled in salt water.

1 can corn.

1 onion.

Fry onion, garlic and pepper in a little butter or oil. Add meat and fry lightly. Add noodles, corn and tomato soup and boil ten minutes. Add cheese and olives and bake one hour.

17 marshmallows

1 1/2 tablespoons vanilla

Salt.

1/2 pint cream (whipped).

Put cocoa in double boiler, add milk gradually to form smooth paste. Add marshmallows and stir occasionally until marshmallows have dissolved. Add vanilla and salt, and cool. Then add beaten cream and put in tray to freeze.

Macaroni Chicken Salad

2 cupsful of elbow macaroni, cooked and chilled.

2 cupsful of cold cooked chicken diced.

1 large cucumber thinly sliced or diced.

2 pimentos chopped.

1 cupful of cooked or mayonnaise dressing.

Brown-bread sandwiches and cocon would go with this salad. Julienne strips of pimentos would garish appropriately.
