New Survey Made For Siuslaw Bridge

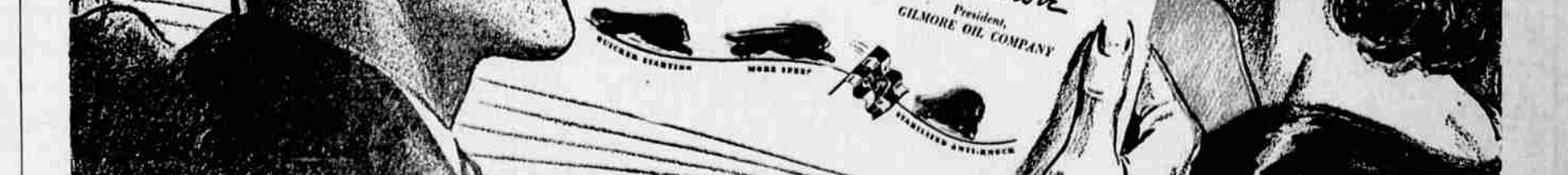
