DREW PLACED ON WORKS COMMITTEE
 Earl M. Drew, Eugene contractor and president of the state building congress, was recommended along with E. B. Aldrich of Pendleton and Bert E. Haney, Portland, for appointment to the advisory committee of the public works committee advisory board Thursday.
