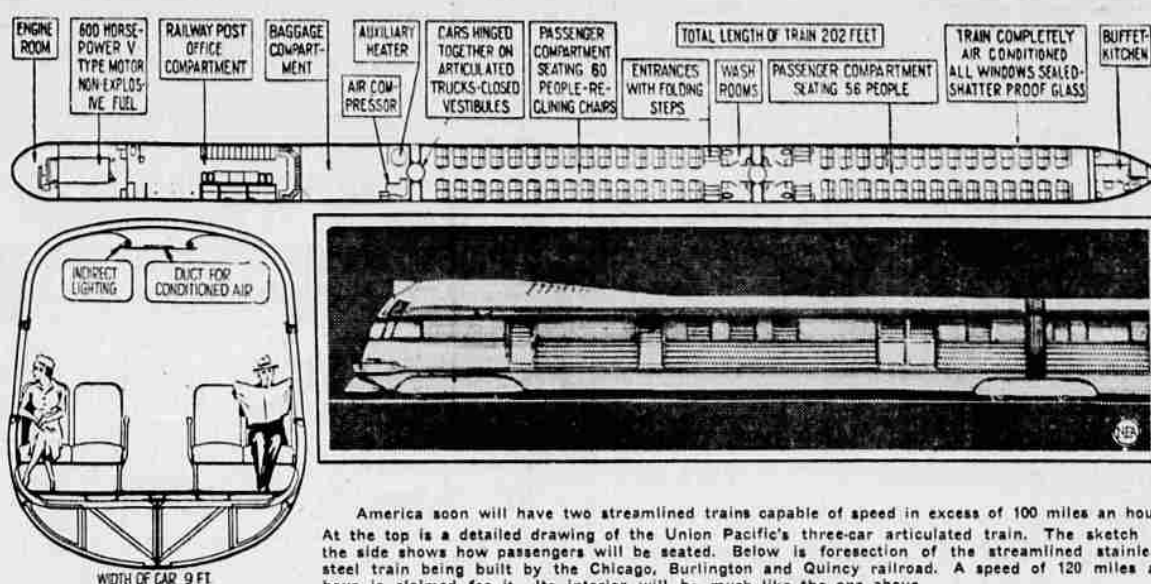


TWO 100-MILES-AN-HOUR TRAINS TO SPEED ACROSS WEST!

Morse, dean of the University of Oregon school of law and chairman of the committee.

Serving with Dean Morse will be Harold Shepherd, dean of the school of law of the University of Washington; Marion Kirkwood, dean of the Stanford school of law; Orrin Mc Murray, dean of law at the University of California; William Hale, dean of law at the University of Southern California; Max Radin, professor of comprehensive law, University of California; H. M. Ailler, professor of psychiatry, University of California. The institute will be held here

Fine Arts Press Gets New Type

Two new fonts of Goudy Forum wood type, cut by Caslon, together with a large assortment of borders, headbands, dashes and other accessories, have been presented to the John Henry Nash Fine Arts press of the University of Oregon, it was announced today by Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism.

The new type, which is designed for use on posters and on printing requiring a large size type, is the gift

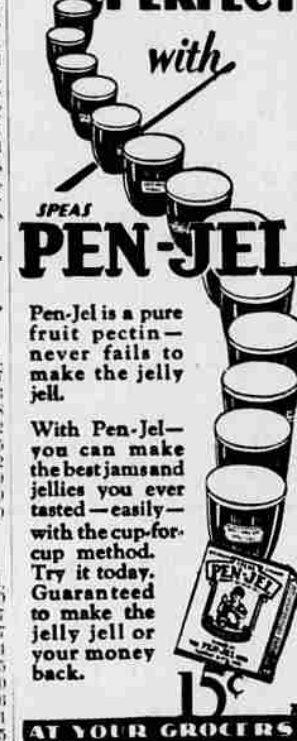
of Dr. Nash, famous printer of San Francisco, who has taken a keen interest in the development of the press, and under his name, he has made numerous gifts to the press and has assisted students in the production of many specimens of fine printing.

The type comes in one font 24 picas or 4 inches in height, and in 12 picas or two inches. It is one of the most beautiful fonts made for press work. It is declared by Robert C. Smith, correspondent of the United States Press. The new type will be used by students next year, and for work requiring letters of this design.
