

GROVE BATTERY E
WINS CAMP HONOR

COTTAGE GROVE, June 30.—(Special)—Battery "E" of this city was not satisfied with carrying off the honors with the big guns at the recent encampment at Fort Stevens, so one of their members won the elimination contest for infantry drill in competition with crack men from the various infantry companies of the regiment.

With the big guns the battery scored 134 points. Its nearest competitor was Marshallfield with 119 points. The lowest score was 83. The target was a moving triangle 30 feet high and 12 feet wide at the base, stationed 7,000 yards out in the ocean. From the gun station it appeared to be little more than a pencil. The battery scored seven hits out of a possible ten, four of which were direct. The other three were in zone A. Two other shots struck in zone B and one in zone 3. All would have hit a destroyer. The contest was held at Ft. Canby on the Washington side. Corporal L. W. Colner was observer and Sergeant Nelson Whipple was pointer.

In the infantry elimination contest the battery entered Sergeant Harley Williams. Some of the other companies and batteries entered two and three men. All were placed in one outfit and put through their paces. Williams was the last to remain and the cheering from the artillery when one of their men walked off with infantry honors was deafening. The battery gives considerable credit to their army instructor, Sergeant Jerak.
