## Onthank to Attend Personnel Meeting August 12 to 20

An invitation to take part in the conference on personnel in higher education, sponsored by the Edward W. Hazen foundation, has been received by Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel administration of the University of Oregon. The session, to be held Aug. 12 to 20 in Estes Park, Colo., will be limited to 60 members. These will be selected from leading institutions in the United States where personnel programs have attained recognition.

Dean Onthank plans to attend the conference and while there will describe work in personnel and guidance now being carried on at the university.

The conference will take up three main issues during the session, each under the direction of a nationally known leader. "Objectives in Higher Education" will be led by Dr. George Willard Frazier, president of Colorado State Teachers' college; "Religious Philosophy of Life Adequate to Our Times," will be the topic of Dr. Robert L. Calhoun, professor of philosophy of religion, Yale Divinity School; and outstanding authorities will lead discussion on "Methods of Counseling."

# LUMBER IS URGED FOR COAST BRIDGES

**ELMIRA**, June 30.—(Special).—At the meeting of Elmira grange Saturday evening, June 24, the following resolution was passed and sent to the paper and highway commission: "Whereas, federal R. F. C. funds are to be used in constructing five large bridges on the Oregon Coast highway, and  
 "Whereas, the construction of these bridges is advocated at this time as a recovery measure to create business and employment, and  
 "Whereas, a great saving in cost can be made by constructing these bridges of lumber;  
 "Therefore, be it resolved by the Elmira grange No. 423, by action of the executive committee, that we recommend to the Oregon state highway commission that the major part of such construction be made from Oregon lumber."
