

TWO YOUTHS WIN WAY TO FINALS IN GOLF TOURNEY

By JAMES S. SHEEHY (United Press Staff Correspondent) VICTORIA, B. C., July 1.—(U.P.)—Two youths—Alan Taylor of Victoria and Albert (Scotty) Campbell of Seattle, 19 and 20 respectively, will fight it out on the difficult Oak Bay links today for the Pacific Northwest amateur golf championship.

Taylor won his way to the finals late Friday by defeating the veteran Dr. O. F. Willing, Portland, one up on the 37th hole. Campbell, freshman at the University of Washington went into the title round by trouncing his fellow Seattleite, Lee Stiel, 5 and 4.

In the women's division, Mrs. Vera Hutchings of Vancouver, B. C., six times northwest champion, will meet Miss Marion McDougall of Portland.

Mrs. Hutchings overcame an early lead to defeat Mrs. George James of Portland, 2 up. Miss McDougall won, 6 and 4, from Mrs. W. A. Kirkham of Seattle.

Rains and chill winds hampered yesterday's semi-final play. The Willing-Taylor match furnished the thrills for the day. At the 25th hole, the veteran Walker cup player was two down to his young adversary.

They finished the 36 holes all square. On the 37th, Willing's tee shot sheered into the rough. His second shot failed to gain the fairway, hitting a tree. Taylor was in three and sank a nine-foot putt for a four and victory.

PORTLAND DEFEATS OAKLAND OAKS, 9-8

(By United Press) Portland, managing to win while Sacramento was losing for a change, today had gained a notch on the leading Senators in the Pacific Coast league. The Beavers are three games from the top. They defeated Oakland, 9 to 8, in 11 innings, while Seattle shut out the Senators, 11 to 0.

Portland's victory also broke its deadlock with Hollywood for second place, the Stars losing to the Missions, 2 to 4, and entering into a tie with Los Angeles for third position. The Angels beat San Francisco, 6 to 4, for their fourth straight victory.

It was the Indians' third triumph over Sacramento in four games. The Senators were unable to fathom the screw ball of Hal Haid, who permitted only four hits. The Indians pounded Byron Saunders and Vonnies for 20 safeties. The batting assault was led by Manager George Burns who made two homers.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—(U.P.)—Gorilla Jones, Akron, Ohio, negro, today still held the middleweight title belt he was awarded by the National Boxing commission, by way of a knockout over Babe Marino, San Francisco, in the last round of their ten-round match.

Jones placed the belt, which he retained after his recent suspension by the association, at stake in the battle with Marino here last night.

The negro carried the lead throughout most of the contest, dazed his opponent with clever boxing and accurate hitting and topped his performance off with the finishing punch a looping right to the jaw.

Marino set an aggressive pace, but the flashy negro was too shifty to be caught and the San Franciscan's blows were lost in the air.

Jones weighed 150½ pounds and Marino 155½.

WASHINGTON BACK IN LEAGUE LEAD

NEW YORK, July 1.—(U.P.)—Washington regained undisputed possession of the American league lead by beating Detroit, 2 to 1, while the New York Yankees dropped out of a top tie by losing to Cleveland, 13 to 12.

Chicago dropped a 4 to 2 decision to Boston when Henry Johnson let the Chicks down with four hits. Philadelphia and St. Louis split a doubleheader, the Browns winning the opener 12 to 11 when pinch-hitter Garms wound up a four-run spurt in the ninth by driving in the winning tally with a single. Jimmy Fox hit his 20th homer. The Athletics took the nightcap, 11 to 7, Frankie Higgins accounting for six of their runs with five hits in five times. His mate Bob Johnson made a homer in the 9th.

The New York Giants' National league lead was reduced to two and a half games when they were blanked, 1 to 0, by St. Louis.

Pittsburgh lost ground by bowing to the Phillies, 5 to 4.

Brooklyn trounced Chicago, 6 to 3, after a three-run burst in the seventh that resulted from four hits. Boston scored its fifth straight victory, beating Cincinnati 9 to 2 when Ben Cantwell held the Reds to seven hits for his tenth win of the season.

300,000 Motorists Need New Licenses

SALEM, Ore., July 1.—(U.P.)—Approximately 300,000 motorists in Oregon have yet to be licensed before Sept. 1, state department records show.

Automobile officials recommended early action, so as to assure prompt and efficient service.

Examinations are dispensed with in most cases under the new law, only those over 70, or who are not normal, or whose driving records are bad, will be required to take an examination.

return of non-gold countries to the yellow metal eventually.

It was believed that all reference to stabilization had been removed from the statement before it was submitted to the American executive. This would leave him free to express a pessimistic attitude toward the plan, which calls for the Federal Reserve Bank of New York to join other central banks in smoothing out sharp dollar fluctuations.

It was suggested in some American quarters that the president may have disapproved the latest draft statement because it strongly stressed gold, in view of the American proposal to use silver as a part of currency reserves.

BANKS MAKE PLANS

NEW YORK, July 1.—(U.P.)—The New York Times says the Federal Reserve Bank and foreign central banks will put into operation plans for a temporary "steading" of the dollar in foreign exchange markets.

The paper in a copyrighted story, says the plans, designed to save the world economic conference, have been "definitely adopted" and will be carried out in such a way as to leave the domestic recovery program of the federal government free from restrictions.

The dollar will not be pegged at any particular level with relation to other currencies; the primary purpose is to end violent fluctuations.

Get F. D.'s Approval

Indications were that the plan would bring the United States and Great Britain into closer relationship with regard to their currencies.

The actual ground work for the new program is reported to have been laid Thursday at the weekly meeting of directors of the New York Federal Reserve bank. The Times was told that the plans meet President Roosevelt's purpose of not allowing any program for currency stabilization at London to interfere with his domestic recovery program.

Officially the United States government will not be party to the actual mechanics of the "steading."

FRANCE TO STICK

PARIS, July 1.—(U.P.)—France intends to remain at the world economic conference and fight for the gold standard regardless of the gold group's reported threat to walk out, it was declared after today's cabinet meeting.

The ministry enthusiastically approved the action in London of Georges Bonnet, French finance minister and leader of the gold bloc.

Camille Chautemps, minister of interior, said at the conclusion of the meeting that "adjustment of the world economic conference is not foreseen." He added that France was hopeful President Roosevelt would approve the currency resolution prepared for him by the conference leaders.
