Final Decision Due On Cannery Wages
SALEM, July 1.—(P)—Final decision on minimum cannery wages for women in Oregon, Washington and California may be reached when welfare and labor officials of the three states meet in San Francisco early next week, it was stated here today.

Already Oregon and Washington have agreed to the 27½ cents an hour for women employees, said State Labor Commissioner C. H. Gram who with state welfare commission Chairman Dorr Kenney of Portland will leave Monday to attend the San Francisco meeting.

DOG POISONING IS REPORTED IN CITY
 Three instances of dog poisoning in the neighborhood of Twenty-second and Columbia streets have been reported to police during the past two days, Chief of Police Carl Bergmann revealed Saturday, after conducting an investigation into the case.

Officers discovered foot prints in one of the yards where a dog was poisoned, the chief said. In another instance, a dog was discovered eating the poisoned meat and was taken to a veterinarian and saved. From clues found, police believed they would be able to solve the case shortly.

"The great danger of the matter is that children might find the meat and become poisoned," Chief Bergmann pointed out. "The poison would result in death if the child were not taken to a physician at once. Any child finding a piece of meat lying in the yard is likely to pick it up and eat it."

Every effort to apprehend the persons responsible for the poisoning is being made, Chief Bergmann declared.

Arbuckle Funeral Is Held Saturday
NEW YORK, July 1.—(AP)—Broadway bade farewell today to Roscoe (Fatty) Arbuckle, rotund comedian who made millions laugh in the days of the silent motion picture.

In answer to a lady's letter

Henry Ford
 Dearborn, Mich.

A lady writes to say that she does not understand why an 8-cylinder car does not cost more to run than a car with fewer cylinders. She refers to my statement that our Ford V-8 develops more power on a gallon of gas than any car we have made.

The use of 8-cylinders does not mean the addition of two or four extra fuel consumers. It is not, for example, a 4-cylinder engine multiplied by two. Our 8-cylinder engine takes the fuel supply of an ordinary 4-cylinder engine and divides it eight ways. And why?
