

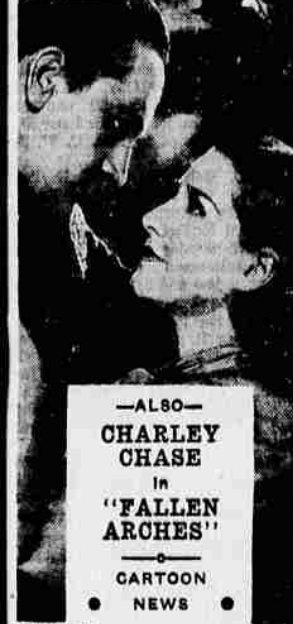
"Topaze" To Show At Heilig; "Temple Drake" At Rex

"Bedtime Story" Opens At McDonald; Colonial Features "Casey Jones"

Maurice Chevalier, debonair as ever, plays a new kind of role in his latest picture, "A Bedtime Story," which opens today at the McDonald. Maurice is the same Paris playboy, carefree and irresponsible, but the "baby" he pursues this time is a real, genuine one-year old and not the blonde, feminine type of the past. Helen Twelvetrees, Edward Everett Horton, Adrienne Ames and Baby Leroy, support the French star. The story opens with Maurice's return to his Paris apartment after a voyage to Africa, and his discovery that someone has abandoned a baby in his car. He calls the police to take it away but by the time the gendarmes have arrived, he has become so in love with the youngster that he won't hear of getting rid of it. From then on, the plot thickens.

"Topaze," which opens Sunday at the Heilig, recommends itself on many counts. It is a smooth and brilliant version of the play that was an outstanding success in New York. It stars John Barrymore opposite Myrna Loy. It is a comedy, sparkling, fresh and brittle. The story tells how Prof. Auguste Topaze, innocent, naive and of simple soul, is suddenly transplanted from his classroom to the exaggerated excitement of the type of drawing room that has spun glass wall paper and in which lounges the enchanting Myrna Loy. The climax finds our professor outwitting the scoundrels who tried to capitalize on his

simplicity and honesty, which they mistake for idiocy.

"The Story of Temple Drake," screen adaptation of a novel by William Faulkner, opens at the Rex Sunday. Miriam Hopkins plays the title role with Jack LaRue, William Gargan, William Collier, Jr., and Irving Pichel at the head of the cast. It is the story of a Southern girl, a curious mixture of the sedate and the wanton. A drunken ride with a college boy ends up in a wreck outside a bootlegger's house. There is a murder and when her real lover traces it, he finds Temple Drake secluded in a tawdry rooming house, the victim of the underworld standard. James O'Connell, Rex manager, has eliminated children's tickets during the run of the film because of its daring nature.

The Baer-Schmeling fight pictures are being seen at the Colonial together with a first run picture, "The Thickens."
