

GOLDEN WEDDING DAY IS OBSERVED

ROOSEVELT BEACH, July 1.—(Special)—An enjoyable affair took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. Bunch on Upper Big Creek today as friends and relatives gathered to observe the golden wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Bunch. The family has been married 50 years, having crossed the plains by ox team in the early 50's, migrating from Iowa.

Mr. Bunch was born in Josephine county in 1860. The Swanson family moved to Oregon some years later. In 1883, Mr. Bunch and Mrs. Anna Augusta Swanson were married June 22, 1883.

In the year of 1905 they, together with their five children, moved to the present where they went to work as a home out of the wilderness. The house and school were unknown.

The household goods were moved pack animals and "Indian wagon" contrivance of poles dragged by a horse where heavy articles were bound to the end being dragged on the ground. The farm buildings, etc., were all made from materials split and hewn from the trees. The old prevailing spirit still dominates for not being aware of the celebration, Mr. Bunch went into the woods to split out material for the completion of the house that was under construction.

Mr. Bunch, turning at noon time for his surprise, found the celebration. This produced an inspiration made Mr. and Mrs. Bunch a of saved lumber to finish the cottage.

Before lunch was served gifts to the couple were presented by Mrs. Bunch and Mrs. Rufus Stonefield. After the basket lunch A. J. Bunch gave a very interesting account of his pioneering in the Big Creek community, followed by a short history of the occasion by Mrs. E. Thompson. Before finishing the marriage of her eldest son, Mr. Bunch, and Mrs. Stonefield, both being old pioneering families, Orville Stonefield came to Oregon and taking places in promoting new enterprises and communities. Miss Stonefield's people came to Washington where her mother's people were early pioneers of Seattle.

The real surprise came when it was revealed that Orville and Joyce were married for two and a half years.

Another interesting feature of the occasion was the fact that Orville's father, Wm. McCollum, and Mr. Bunch were old boyhood friends, separated in their early teens and seeing old acquaintanceship since arrival on Big Creek of Mr. McCollum a few years ago.
