BEAVERS DEFEAT SEATTLE IN DOUBLE-HEADER

SENATORS DEFEAT YANKEES; INCREASE LEAD IN AMERICAN

NEW YORK, July 5.—(AP)—Many baseball observers believe the New York Yankees began for another American league pennant this season floundered yesterday when they lost both ends of a holiday double-header at their home stadium to the leading Washington Senators.

Washington was only half a game ahead before the twin bill, but the Yankees failed to come through in this crisis under the most favorable conditions, when the largest crowd of the major league season, 77,000 home fans, was cheering them on. Both games were close: 6 to 5 in 10 innings, and 2 to 3, but that has no effect on the standing, which now shows the Senators two and a half games ahead.

Philadelphia lost to Boston, 14 to 4, when their own eight errors allowed nine unearned runs in the opener. They lost the second game to one when the Red Sox pounded Earnshaw and Freitas for 15 hits.

Cleveland and Chicago divided a twin bill, the Indians winning the opener, 5 to 2, and the Chicago took the second, 6 to 3.

Detroit and St. Louis likewise split, the Tigers taking the opener, 7 to 4, and the Browns won the second game, 6 to 5.

The New York Giants' National league lead was pared down to five games after dropping two decisions to Boston, 3 to 6 and 8 to 5.

St. Louis gained on the Giants by sharing two games with Pittsburgh. The Cards took the first, 5 to 1, behind Bill Hallahan's first-hit fling. The Pirates took the second, 4 to 2.

Chicago and Cincinnati broke even, the Cubs winning the opener, 4 to 0, when Guy Bush let the Reds down with four hits. But the Reds took the night cap, 5 to 1.

The tail-end Phillies downed Brooklyn twice, 5 to 3, and 4 to 2.

THE HAIG MAKES 68 IN GOLF MEET

ST. ANDREW'S, Scotland, July 5.—(AP)—Walker Hagan of Detroit, former title-holder, spreadeagled the British open field today with a first-round score of 68.

Hagan's score, five below par, equaled the St. Andrews old course record of 68, held by Bobby Jones and George Duncan until yesterday when Bill Nolan of Portmarnock, Ireland, set a new mark of 67.

The veteran from overseas was out in 32 and back in 36.

Hagan captured the early lead held by Cyril J. H. Tully, English amateur with a score of 70, three below par. Still earlier a score of 71 was made by Nolan who has been 10 strokes below par for the three rounds played in the 1933 competition. The scores made yesterday and Monday have no bearing on the final outcome. They merely qualified the players for the 72-hole test which started today.

Next came Gene Sarazen, Coral Gables, Fla., defending champion, who has a 72, as did George T. Dunlap, Jr., New York, favorite among the amateurs, and Archie Compston, ruddy British giant.
