

GANG BIG SHOTS TO BE TARGETS FOR NEW DRIVE

WASHINGTON, July 5.—(AP)—Gangster's big shots are likely to bear the brunt of the justice department's initial moves to end racketeering.

Joseph B. Keenan, a Cleveland lawyer, chosen as an assistant attorney general to lead the government's effort to quell the activities of organized crime, said he intended to go after "gangland leadership" first.

Keenan was invited to accept the federal post by Attorney General Cummings. His nomination has been approved by Postmaster General Farley, the patronage arbiter. Formal announcement of his selection is expected soon after President Roosevelt returns here.

Much of Cummings' time since he became attorney general has been centered on the challenge presented through kidnapping and other gangland methods for collecting tribute.

Recently a federal agent was among four officers killed at Kansas City and Cummings said he considered this a declaration of war by the underworld.

Thus far, the government has found the income tax laws most effective in dealing with underworld leaders. Al Capone was sent to Atlanta by that route.

Additional powers to handle combinations of criminals probably will be asked at the next congress and states may be asked also to adopt a uniform criminal code. Fundamental changes in criminal procedure in both federal and state courts to conform to those in English and Canadian courts may result.

Cummings has promised the gangster drive will be thorough and intensive, if unopposed.

Blind Woman Has First Air Ride; Enjoys Experience

"Well, it wasn't as bad as the roller-coaster at Portland, and after I got used to it I enjoyed it very much," said Mrs. G. A. Ebner, 42 1/2. Thirtieth avenue west, after her first airplane ride the other day. Mrs. Ebner has been blind most of her life and has never seen an airplane, but her first ride proved a thriller, she declared.

"I could tell when we went up and when we went down," she continued. "My stomach told me when we came down. The only way I could get the impression of height, however, was by the coldness of the air."

"Of course I missed seeing the ground, I think it must be wonderful from the air, but the actual experience of riding in the air, even though I couldn't see, was interesting."

Mrs. Ebner was piloted by H. Sander of the Hobi Airways in her trip and admits that though she was a "little scared at first," she soon got over that and enjoyed the ride.

"I thought at first I wouldn't know it if we fell and that gave me more courage, but I soon found out that I would have known it all right," she said.

MINERS GET RAISE

UNIONTOWN, Pa., July 5.—(AP)—Salary increases for more than 7,000 miners in the Payette and Green county fields were in effect today. A 10 per cent wage increase—the second within 30 days—was announced for 6,000 employees of the Frick Coal and Coke Co.
