

PACIFIC RELATIONS INSTITUTE TO HOLD MEETING AT BANFF

An unusual opportunity for study and research in social science will be afforded experts and students in this field in this country and Canada at the meeting of the Institute of Pacific Relations, to be held in Banff, in the Canadian Rockies, August 24. It was announced here today by Dr. R. W. Leighton, executive secretary of research, who has just received details of the session from Dr. Arnold Bennett, formerly president of the University of Oregon and a member of the institute.

Dr. Bennett is now in Washington, D. C., as director of the Research Institute, one of the outstanding organizations for research in social science. He expects to attend the meetings in Banff.

The Institute of Pacific Relations was founded primarily to promote better understanding among nations of the Pacific through interchange of ideas, and numbers among its members outstanding leaders in all Pacific countries.

Previous meetings have been held in Honolulu, Hanoi, and Tokyo, and this session will be the first on this side of the Pacific coast.

While meetings will not be open to the public, the session will be reported in detail in newspapers and periodicals, and the fact that it is being held in this part of the Pacific Basin will give those interested a much more complete account than has been forthcoming from previous meetings, Dr. Leighton points out.

Countries that will be represented include United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, China, Japan, Philippines, Indonesia, Hawaiian Islands and Great Britain.

Charles F. Leighton, Honolulu, general secretary, is now in Vancouver, B. C., making preliminary arrangements for the session. Leighton is a member of the Pacific Council, Dr. Bennett's term, of the Imperial University of Tokyo, is chairman of the research committee and Dr. H. H. Henshaw, in chairman of the International program committee.

The session four years ago, held in Tokyo, was attended by Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, director of the University of Oregon Museum of Art, who was named as a delegate by Dr. H. H. Henshaw. In 1927 in Honolulu Dr. H. H. Henshaw, director of the University of Oregon and the Social Science Research Council.

University of Oregon faculty members who have followed the work of the Institute closely include Dr. H. H. Henshaw, research professor of history; Dr. L. R. Crossman, professor of sociology and an authority on anthropology; Dr. Harold J. Noble, assistant professor of history who has drawn wide recognition for his research in history of Korea and other parts of the Orient; Dr. J. J. Leighton, head of the department of music, who has traveled extensively in the Pacific Basin; Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of the college of social science; Wayne L. Moore, dean of the school of law, and a student of international law, and Dr. P. A. Parsons, professor of sociology.

SCENIC RESEARCH AT CRATER LAKE WILL START SOON

Enthusiasm over the possibilities of the research project in appreciation of a place that will be carried out at Crater Lake during the summer by a staff of about eight experts, Dr. W. Leighton, executive secretary of research for the University of Oregon and Dr. Arnold Bennett, president and head of the project in the school of fine arts, returned this week from a preliminary survey of the region.

The project, funded entirely by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, will be carried out at Crater Lake under the direction of John T. Morrison, head of the corporation. It will have for its purpose the development of a program to be made available to the public as a project of national importance. The results of their work will be used as an aid to the education program of the National Park Service. Work is expected to be under way by July 20.

Although the heavy snow makes field work and feasible just at present, Crater Lake is at its best seasonally. It was declared by Dr. Leighton. The lake, surrounded by dazzling white peaks, is a sight that should thrill viewers as much as it will later in the summer when it will be seen in its setting of green, he declared.

Crater Lake lodge is easily accessible over the highway and is now open for visitors, Dr. Leighton said. Names of those who will take part in the project and details of the study will be made public next week, Dr. Leighton said.

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SCHOOL REPORT SHOWS CUTS IN OPERATING COSTS

EUGENE, July 4.—Operating costs in receipts of more than \$100,000 and a corresponding decrease in operating expenditures is shown in the annual report of Springfield school district No. 24, which Chapter Butler, school clerk, will submit to the school board at its monthly meeting Thursday evening.

Total receipts for the year ending June 30, 1933, were \$230,664.73, expenditures \$130,664.73, outstanding warrants \$79,222.24, cash in hand, \$1,500.56. For the previous year receipts totaled \$41,000.73, expenditures \$27,444.50 and outstanding warrants \$3,000.56.

Receipts for the district during the year just closed decreased in all items, the greatest loss being in the district tax, which this year paid only \$17,202.90, as compared to \$23,900.37 from this source in 1932.

In every item except debt service and bond charges the expenses of the district were reduced by the school board. In the figures which follow the first is the expenditure for the year just ended, the second the corresponding figure for 1932. General fund, \$10,000.00; maintenance, \$25,000.00; operation of plant, \$4,000.00; maintenance and repair, \$1,000.00; auxiliary services, \$1,000.00; insurance, \$1,000.00; capital outlay, \$5,000.00; debt service, \$11,000.00; \$12,000.00.

Items in the debt service include the payment of \$1,000 on principal on bonds, principal on warrants, outstanding at last report, \$4,000.00; interest on bonds, \$1,000.00; interest on warrants, \$1,000.00.

Receipt items for 1933 are as follows: Cash on hand, \$1,500.56; district school tax, \$17,202.90; state school fund, \$1,000.00; tuition for pupils below high school, \$4,000.00; tuition for high school, \$4,000.00; tuition for students at Springfield high school, \$4,000.00; county high school tuition paid for tuition and transportation, \$2,000.00; other sources, \$1,000.00.

The district has a total indebtedness of \$17,202.90, which includes bonds totaling \$68,000.00 and outstanding warrants for \$3,000.56.

U. S. MAY TAKE OVER RELIEF WORK



A plan whereby all relief work in Lane county and other counties of the state would come under federal supervision was announced by Clarence Reynolds, field manager for the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, at the meeting of the local committee at the courthouse.

This plan must be adopted if the county is to draw money from the R. F. C. It was stated by Mr. Reynolds, although he admitted that he had received little information as to details of the plan. Another meeting will be held next Wednesday at which time Mr. Reynolds said he hoped to have more information on the subject.

"Every member of the County R. F. C. committee is opposed to the new plan and expressed a desire to retain the present system of relief," said Mayor Elmer Latta, chairman of the committee, Thursday. "The way the plan appears at present is that relief work is to be on a strictly federal basis, eliminating local agencies."

Mr. Latta said so far as he knows there is no complaint of the system used by the local Red Cross in the handling of the county's relief work and he had no means of ascertaining whether or not the activities of this organization would be curtailed. The committee members would like to see the work as far forward as it has in the past, he said.
