

REPEAL GROUP TO STOP IN EUGENE

Plans for a 600 mile "Motorcade" that will visit 20 Oregon cities in the next two weeks including Eugene, were announced Wednesday by the Oregon division of the Women's Organization for national prohibition reform.

The motorcade will arrive in Eugene at 8 p. m. Monday, July 17. They will bring with them speakers who will tell the voters why they are advocating the repeal of the eighteenth amendment and the repeal of the Oregon state prohibition law. Also they will explain to the voters how to cast their ballot for the repeal delegates to the ratification convention. Open air meetings will be held in each of the cities to be visited.

The motorcade is under the direction of Mrs. David Honeyman of Portland, state chairman of the organization, and Miss Lillian C. Harris of New York City, representative of the national council of the organization.

The purpose of the trip, according to Mrs. Honeyman, is to stimulate interest among repealists to vote in the special election which is to be held July 21.

"Oregon will ratify the repeal of the 18th amendment if the repealist strength is voted," Mrs. Honeyman stated.

FRENCH COMBING WOOL IN DEMAND

BOSTON, July 7.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "Wool is higher again this week by about two cents, clean basis, all around. Demand favors the fine French combing wools, so far as the volume of business done is concerned but medium wools and relatively scarce and dear."

"The manufacturing position is eminently sound and the buyers of cloth are now compelled to accept allotments from the mills, a situation which has not obtained for some years—consumption of wool at the mills is proceeding heavily."

"Little wool is left for sale in the hands of the western growers. What is left, is held at prohibitive prices. Mohair is in limited supply and very strong with Texas hair quoted at \$1.32 cents."

Several men had gone to Newport and had a quarrel over who was to sit on the front seat of a truck going back to camp. The two men in question drew knives and inflicted slight wounds on one or two other men in the party.

As a rule the men in the camps in the Siuslaw and Willamette national forests are well behaved and very little trouble has occurred in the camps, forest officials state.

Heavy Mail Causes Curtailed Service
