

PRICE ADVANCE STORY

to \$1 per bushel for the first time in three years.

The widest advances were:
Round steak—Syracuse, N. Y., 12 cents per pound.

Sirloin steak—Boulder, Colo., 8 cents per pound.

Rib roast—Syracuse and Boulder, 8 cents per pound. (Some cities reported declines in rib roast ranging to 6 cents per pound.)

Pork chops—Charlotte, N. C., 8 cents per pound.

Bacon—Hendersonville, N. C., 8 cents per pound.

Lamb chops—Kansas City, Denver, Boulder (Colo.), San Francisco, Hendersonville, 10 cents per pound.

Butter—Raleigh, N. C.—10 cents per pound.

Milk—Kansas City, Cleveland, Chicago, San Francisco, Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Pittsburgh all reported 1 cent per quart gain.

Several cities reported broad price increases were imminent but only Cleveland and Syracuse reported price changes.

The price range in the 16 cities on the various commodities shows:

April 1 July 7

Round steak . . . 15-30c lb. 22-35c lb.

Sirloin steak . . . 20-35c lb. 20-35c lb.

Lamb chops . . . 20-45c lb. 25-55c lb.

Bacon . . . 14-28c lb. 19-30c lb.

Butter . . . 18-27c lb. 27-31c lb.

(The cities reporting 35 cent steak on April 1 have prices unchanged since that time and several cities have gained to 35 cents per pound since April 1. In New York City bacon prices have declined 8 cents per pound.)

Cereals have advanced sharply, again in conformity with the rising prices in cereal grains. In Denver one common breakfast cereal has leaped in price until it is now selling at the peak reached in 1922-23. Denver grocers say that price increases are outstripping the purchasing power and that many persons are buying cheaper foodstuffs, for instance substituting corn meal for flour.

LOCAL PRICES HIGHER

The local prices are generally in line with the prices listed above. It was revealed in a check here Friday.

Round steak has advanced about 5 cents here; sirloin, around 4 cents; pork chops 2 cents; bacon three cents; lamb chops 5 cents. The rib roasts, however, have not advanced here as listed in the national survey.

Milk has gone up a cent a quart here as elsewhere.

Butter has advanced 5 and 6 cents here, a bit more than listed in the national survey.

Sugar is running about \$1 a sack higher.

Flour and breakfast foods will be advancing here Monday, dealers said Friday.

disappearance of this Portland pilot and then we began to wonder if we might not have heard his plane crash. We are quite sure of the direction of the noise—northwest of Moore's camp—perhaps a half mile to a mile and somewhere in the deep brush.

"In that region there are some large dunes between the stretches of woods and to a pilot they might appear to be level fields. A pilot with a falling engine might have tried to make a landing there and seeing his mistake endeavored to gain altitude and crashed in the woods.

"It would be almost essential to scout the area with a plane because the brush is so dense that a man on foot might come within 50 feet of a wreck and never see it. We are doing our best to explore the area but so far we haven't any clue beyond the noise of the crash."

Fliers say that while it would be unusual for a pilot to get so far west of the course and the Lane coast, it would be entirely possible in a fog, especially if the pilot followed the light fog over the Calapooyas westward into the denser fogs over the Coast range.

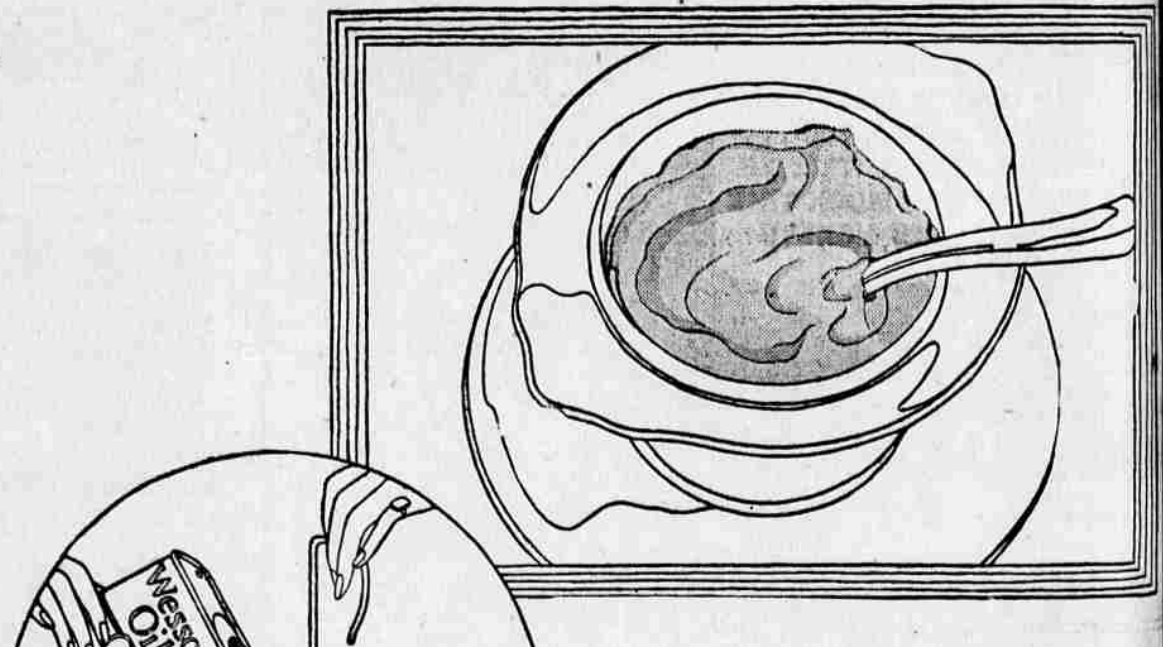
