

DENSMORE SHUTE ANNEXES BRITISH OPEN GOLF TITLE

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 8.—(AP)—H. Densmore Shute, 28-year-old American professional from Philadelphia, today captured the British open golf championship, beating his countryman, Craig Wood of Deal, N. J., in an all-American 36-hole play-off.

Shute led from the first hole to the last and defeated Wood by five strokes with a fine exhibition of all around shot-making.

The new champion shot the double round in 75-74—149, only three strokes over par for the 36 holes. Wood's score was 78-76—154.

Wood and Shute finished the regulation 72 holes yesterday tied at 292 after one of the most exciting finishes in the history of the tournament.

Shute succeeds to the title won last year by another American, Gene Sarazen, who failed by only one stroke to tie the leaders. This is the tenth successive year the classic trophy of British golf has gone to a representative of the United States.

Shute was much too consistent with his irons and much too steady around the greens for Wood, who dropped four strokes at the outset with sixes on the first two holes and never was able to overcome that handicap. He was never closer than two strokes behind and trailed by three at the end of the morning round.

Wood three-putted three greens on the outgoing nine of the afternoon. This left him six shots behind and a hopeless prospect. His par golf over the last nine trimmed only one shot from Shute's margin.

CHINESE FIGHTER BEATS ANDERSON

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—(AP)—Ah Wing Lee, Portland Chinese lightweight, invaded the ranks of contenders for Barney Ross' lightweight crown when he smashed out a knockout over Eddie Anderson, Wyoming thunderbolt, in the main-event bout here last night.

It was a furiously contested battle from the start. Anderson charged at the opening bell, sending Lee to the ropes with a flurry of lefts and rights. In retreating, Wing Lee knocked Anderson to the canvas for the count of four with an uppercut.

The "Thunderbolt" just named for his gameness and stout heart, couldn't stand up against the deliberate punches of the Chinese youth and went down five times. The final coup came in the third. Lee caught the Chinese boxer with a flurry of blows and the bout was over.

Anderson was chosen by Tony Canzoneri, former lightweight title holder, to "test" Ah Wing.

Hal Mo, former Oregon State football halfback and Great Falls, Mont., youth, made his debut in the professional ring by scoring a one-round knockout over Duke Plimkitt, 165, Portland.

MRS. MOODY WINS ENGLISH TOURNEY

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 8.—(AP)—Mrs. Helen Willis Moody equalled Suzanne Lenglen's mark of six Wimbledon tennis championships today when she defeated Dorothy Round, English Sunday school teacher, 6-4, 6-8, 6-3, in the final round of the all-England tournament.

Miss Round, conceded little chance to furnish Mrs. Moody with more than a workout, gave the great Californian one of the sternest battles of her career, and won the second set. In winning the second set at 6-8, Miss Round accomplished a feat that none of the world's greatest players have been able to do since 1926.

The third set was played in a tense atmosphere, with the gallery daring to dream of Mrs. Moody's defeat for the first time in almost a decade. But the champion refused to allow Miss Round's rally to perturb her, and proceeded to blast her off the court with untouchable drives and volleys.

President Roosevelt, the recovery administration sought means to curb the spurt of production but at the same time to assure new jobs and more pay now.

The state officials were from 26 commonwealths which already have employment agencies. Their work is to be coordinated through a federal clearing house so that if there is an unemployed bricklayer in one state and a job for him in another he may be told about the job.

This arrangement, called for by the recently enacted Wagner-Peyser law, is to assist in mobilizing workers for the public construction program.

At the same time, President Roosevelt and Hugh S. Johnson, industrial administrator, were represented as concerned at the fact that production and living costs had increased more since March than had pay and the rate of employment.

They were advised that some manufacturers were taking advantage of present low costs to lay up stocks of goods for later sale at higher prices. That would have been all right had it been done by the employment of more workers or had workers been given more money.

But the president and Johnson were told that some producers simply were working their present employees overtime.

To stimulate agreements by industries to limit hours and raise pay, Johnson yesterday warned that "if we can't come along here with increased purchasing power to support this higher production I shudder to think what will happen."

While he was making that statement, the American Federation of Labor, in a monthly survey, reported that 1,200,000 unemployed had gone back to work from March to May but that the workers' pay had risen only 2.5 per cent while food costs were going up 3.7 per cent.

per cent of the 30-cents-per-bushel tax on wheat. On all other flours, the tax will be 23.47 per cent.

Wheat processed by or for a producer is exempted from the tax if it is to be consumed by his own family, employees or household. That is interpreted by the bureau of internal revenue, which will handle the tax collections, as providing the farmer an opportunity to avoid taxation by having his own wheat ground for his own consumption or exchanging it for wheat for its equivalent in flour made from similar wheat.

Likewise tax-exempt are wheat products received by organizations for charitable distribution. Refunds of the tax will be made to those delivering wheat products to such organizations.

In cases where millers export flour they will be entitled to refunds equal to the amount of the tax they paid on the wheat used in manufacturing the flour. Wheat moving in export channels will not be taxed, the levy being applied only to foodstuffs processed from wheat for domestic consumption.

would be the height of folly to permit these assets to be destroyed.

Proposals to save a forest strip along the Crater lake road have been considered impractical and the request will be made for the federal government to take over the entire area as an addition to national park and recreational lands.

Plans for the utilization of Boy Scouts and Four-H clubs in the preservation and development of roadside beauty were outlined at the meeting. J. Ed Turnbull read a report by Eric W. Allen, suggesting that Boy Scouts assume as definite projects the surveying and listing of beauty spots along all state highways and county roads which can be saved or beautified at no expense or at small expense.

George W. Peavy, dean of the school of forestry at Oregon State college, explained the work that is being done in tree planting with the co-operation of schools in all parts of the state and the project for supervised highway plantings by Four-H clubs which is being developed.

"It is not merely a matter of saving trees and saving beauty but of saving the youth of the country," said Dean Peavy, "for in these times, our young people are demanding something to do, something of worthwhile interest to develop their talents."

Through the roadside council, hundreds of property owners in all parts of Oregon are being induced to sign pledges stating that they will not permit the use of their land for billboards or other unsightly signs. Honorary membership in the organization is being extended to those people and each one receives an attractive plaque designed by Mrs. William Skinner, of Eugene.

In addition, Mrs. Honeyman explained, a great deal of work is being done in Oregon to expand the "White List." This is a list of advertisers who agree not to use any form of billboard advertising or other signing which mars Oregon scenery.

"In this state," said Mrs. Honeyman, "we are not going to make any compromises with zoning or any of the other devices to perpetuate nuisances."

A statewide membership campaign is under way and it is bringing good results.

Mrs. Honeyman was authorized to make arrangements for an exhibit at the state fair in Salem and at the International Livestock exhibition in Portland. In connection with the Portland show, a conference at the University club is planned and representatives from the entire Pacific coast will be invited to attend.

the round the world flier was not necessary.

Whether Commander Parker would make the rescue was left to his discretion because there might be circumstances in the case that were unknown at headquarters.

"It is rare that an order is issued in such cases," an official said, "because there might be unforeseen complications. We would be gratified if the Northland rescued Matern. Commander Parker is one of our ablest officers. He may be on his way to the Siberian coast now."

SOVIETS SEND PLANE
MOSCOW, July 8.—(AP)—A Soviet seaplane going to the aid of stranded Jimmie Matern will fly to Alaska for new parts to repair Matern's plane and permit him to continue his solo flight around the world if repairs are possible, the United Press learned today.

If repairs are impossible—and dispatches reporting that the motor of his plane was "wrecked" indicated this might be the case—the Soviet plane will carry Matern on to Nome, Professor Otto Schmidt, Polar explorer and head of all government Arctic air stations, told the United Press.

The Soviet flier Levonarsky was speeding in a heavy hydroplane with a crew of four to help Matern, reported safe in Anadyr near the Bering Strait.
