recovered prosperity by what the president calls a "partnership" between business and the government.

Majority Agreed

The situation now is this: A majority of the cotton textile industry has agreed upon minimum wages for a part of their employees and the maximum number of hours they shall work.

About 23 per cent of the industry, officials reported, have not signed that agreement. They will be granted hearings this week. If they do not accept, then the government will be ready to demand that they apply for federal licenses to operate. These licenses will require compliance with the agreement, which was made a law by presidential promulgation.

The president's modifications and clarifications of the code left it unchanged as to minimum wages and maximum hours. Nor did they remove the bar against employment of children under 16 or the stipulation that no cotton textile plant may operate its machines more than 80 hours a week.

Provisions Added

It did direct that the code should apply to white-collar office employees; that the amounts by which higher paid workers' salaries now exceed those of the lowest-paid shall be maintained; that the industry shall prepare a similar code for cleaners and outside workers, now exempted; that repair shop crews, engineers, electricians and watchmen, if employed more than 40 hours a week, shall get time and a half for overtime.

Because this was the first such agreement, and because conditions are changing, the president made it operative for only four months. At the end of that time, employers and workers may be asked to accept modifications or the plan may be extended as is.

scheduled to leave Khabarovsk early today for Anadyr.

Further advice received here today said Matern telegraphed his New York representatives July 8 from Anadyr asking that a seaplane be sent from Alaska to take him to American territory. This would indicate that the flier felt that it was impossible to repair the "Century of Progress."

But the American emphasized that he had not given up his attempt to encircle the globe by air.

"Russia provided me with all possible assistance," Matern was quoted as having said to his American representative by telegraph. "Desiring to achieve my round-the-world flight I request that a seaplane be sent from Alaska on which I could fly from Anadyr."

The Moscow foreign office, asked whether an American plane would be permitted to go for Matern, replied that the question had not been considered.

Australian Coast Is "Blockaded" by Invasion of Crabs

MELBOURNE, Australia, July 10.—(AP)—A horde of giant crabs have "blockaded" the coast of the state of Victoria and are causing havoc in the fishing industry.

The crustaceans, pear-shaped and of a reddish hue, measure from two to five feet across with their claws extended. Fishermen believe them to be a species of the giant Japanese crabs which grow to ten feet. Others believe they are of the large Australian spider crab species. The invasion covers practically all

The world economic conference check has not dealt a mortal blow to chances of an agreement on vital world problems, declared the chancellor.

The parity, awaiting the outcome of the airing of British policy in the house of commons, nevertheless again was brought to a standstill waiting to see whether Great Britain would throw her support to the gold countries or lean toward development of the sterling-dollar block.

ADJOURN JULY 25

LONDON, July 10.—(AP)—The steering committee of the world economic conference today decided tentatively

that the parity would be adjusted on or about July 26, it was said in well informed quarters.

The committee found unbroken the deadlock over the question whether monetary matters should be discussed. The monetary commission of the conference, however, at a meeting later today, voted 23 to 15 to retain all the original questions on the agenda for treatment in the further work of the congress.

The vote by the monetary group was seen as a defeat for France and her gold allies but the strength of the opposing minority was enough to indicate the size of the difficulty which has arisen over the future program.

The plot is plausible, the dialogue plenty good, and the acting grand. Charles Butterworth, in a supporting role, turns in a smooth performance, and would steal the show from a less brilliant actor than Mrs. Tracy's little boy, Lee. Madge Evans is "adequate" as the girl dick that Tracy falls for, while Frank Morgan makes an excellent crooked doctor. The Sharkey-Carnera fight pictures and a Bobby Jones golf reel are also on the bill, making it all-star entertainment from first to last. Tuesday is the last day.

One of the most spectacular fires ever staged for a motion picture, and one which caused studio executives keen anxiety during its taking, is seen in the Technicolor production,
