

BER CODES AS TO CONSERVE SOURCES URGED

WASHINGTON, July 10. — (AP) — President Roosevelt wants the present code of practices being framed by the lumber industry under the National Recovery act to include provisions for the prevention of depletion of forest lands and the large-scale adoption of the yield policy in lumbering.

The chief executive's position was made public by Secretary Wallbridge in a letter he addressed to Dr. Wilson Compton, president of the National Lumber Manufacturers association.

President asks me to tell you that any code relating to the prevention of depletion of forest lands and the large-scale adoption of the yield policy in lumbering must be based on the conservation of the forest resources and the highest interest of both the lumbering industry and the public.

Today a delegation of lumbermen met for several hours with the assistant national administrator, regarding the code they hope to have presented next week.

The meeting Compton said was a success and that the men who came gave him some guidance for the final administration of the final code.

However, he said, was entirely new and did not involve presentation of a tentative draft.

Compton added he was confident that the code would be presented formally next week.

Wallace in a report on a plan for American forestry and to congress said there was of adequate provision now for the production of private lands.

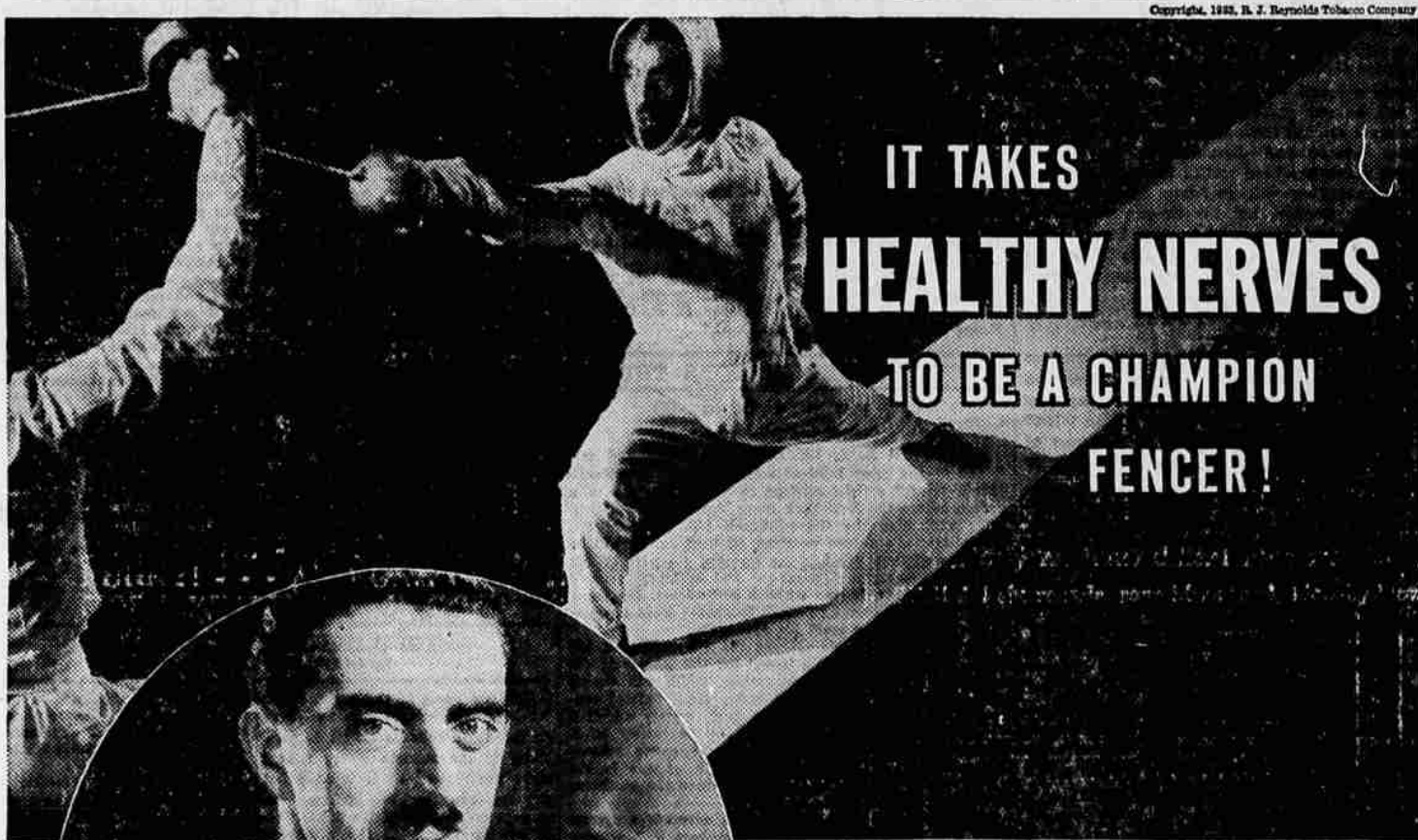
