

Eugene Defeats Portland Team, 4 To 3 Sunday

LOCAL TEAM TAKES LEAD IN THIRD AS BATTERS GET HITS

The Eugene Townies defeated the Wolves of Portland here Sunday at the Lane county fairgrounds by the score of 4 to 3. Bob Wiltshire, youthful Townie pitcher, held them to 4 hits, allowed only 1 earned run and struck out 9 opposing batters.

Both infields played ragged ball and were responsible for the pitchers getting into trouble in many of the innings. In the eighth inning a double play by Eugene aided Wiltshire, out of a hole after he had walked Eatch, first man up. He was sacrificed to second by Wilson, but Richards, next up, hit a ground ball to Wirth who threw to Inman to tag Eatch between second and third. Inman then threw to Kelsey at first to catch Richards.

Wiltshire scored first in the second inning when after one out Eatch was safe on an error, took third on a single by Wilson and scored when Richards hit a long fly to center field. Foulk struck out to end the inning.

Eugene came back in the third inning to take the lead by scoring two runs. With one out, Wirth singled, Green struck out, but Quinn hit to score Wirth. Quinn took third on an error at second base when the ball rolled to the outfield and scored on a single by Bishop. Kelsey was hit by the pitcher and Van Dusen walked, but Inman struck out to end the inning.

In the fifth inning Portland scored two more to forge ahead, 3 to 2. Foulk, first up, singled but was forced out at second by scoring two runs. With one out, Kech was on a fly to center field, but Johnson scored on the play. Leach scored on an infield hit by Helmbocher and Eatch was safe on an error. With the bases full, Wiltshire tightened down and struck out Wilson for the final out. This ended Portland's scoring for the game.

Eugene scored two runs to win the game in the seventh inning. Wirth, first up, sent a fly to right field for one out. Green then singled, Wiltshire was sacrificed to third by Quinn who was safe on an error. Bishop then hit to short for the second out, but Green scored on the play. Quinn scored with the winning run from third when Richards dropped a pitch by Foulk which was a little wide of the plate. Kelsey walked but Van Dusen ended the inning by hitting a long fly to right field.

Foulk pitched good ball, holding Eugene to 5 hits most of which though, came when needed. Eugene took advantage of the condition of Richards' arm, the Federal catcher, and stole seven bases, Charles Wirth being the leading pilferer with four. Stealing second and third on two different occasions.

LOS ANGELES, July 10.—(AP)—Vanquished oarsmen of three eastern colleges were homeward bound today with the assurance they would be invited to return to Long Beach next year for a chance to avenge their defeat by the University of Washington in the first intercollegiate regatta ever held on the Pacific coast.

W. C. Acherman, graduate manager of the University of California at Los Angeles, co-sponsor of the event, said the contest for the Schuyler trophy, emblematic of national supremacy, would be staged annually over the 2,000 meter course at the Long Beach marine stadium.

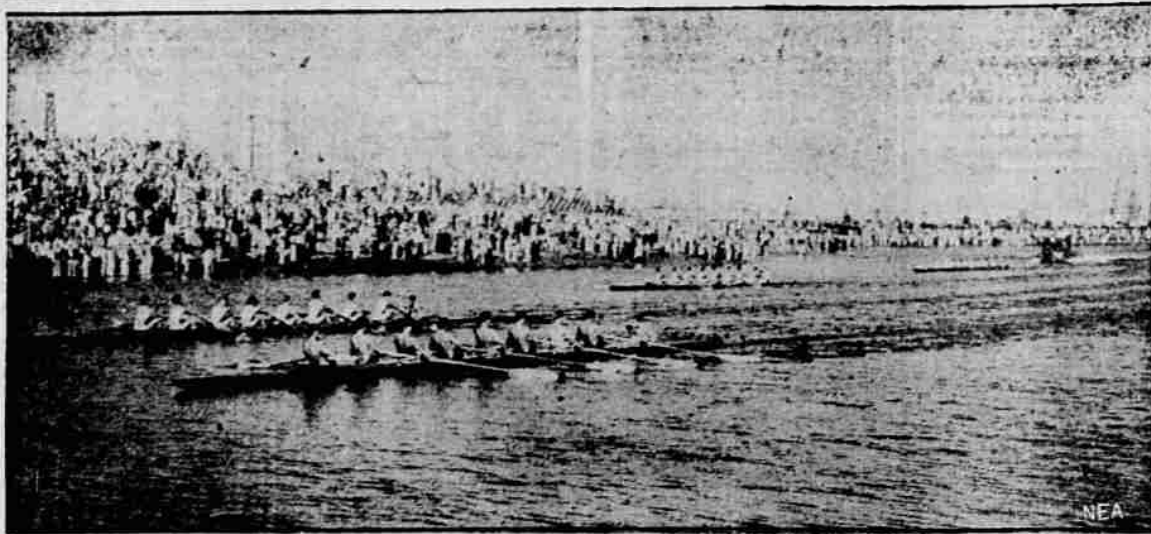
Inspired by the spectacle, the University of Southern California decided today to add rowing to its sports calendar, provided the necessary appropriation can be obtained.

BEAVERS ADVANCE NEAR FIRST PLACE; DEMAGGIO KEEPS UP

Apparently thriving on extra work, the Portland Beavers were within half a game of the first place Sacramento Senators in the Coast league pennant tussle today after handling Seattle 9 to 1 series trouncing.

The 1932 champions completed the route of the seventh place Indians with three week-end victories, winning 7 to 1 Saturday night and 11 to 9 and 4 to 3 in yesterday's doubleheader. The Indians outbait Portland 17 to 11 in the opener and bunched their blows, but three Beaver double plays kept down the visitor's run total. Timelier hitting by his mates gave Rudy Kallio the decision in the second game pitching duel with Dutch Ulrich.

Sacramento nosed out Oakland 3-2 Saturday and took the 7-inning nightcap yesterday, 6-5 to capture the series, 5-4. In the first half of yesterday's twin bill, Bill Ludolph whitewashed the league leaders, 1-0, to win a great pitching battle from Lauri Vinel. Each hurler granted but two safeties.

The Missions snapped out of their losing streak during the week-end and won 7 to 5 Saturday at Los Angeles and 9-3 in the 7-inning second game yesterday. The Angels took yesterday's opener 10-4, scoring 7 unearned runs off Ted Pillelto on 6 Mission errors. Los Angeles won the series, 7 to 2.

Four aces of the Hollywood mound staff tried to hold Joe Demaggio, 18-year-old Seal rookie, hitless over the week-end and all failed. Today the surprising outfielder had run his consecutive game hitting streak to 40, three short of the Coast league record set in 1915 by Jack Noss of Oakland. He collected two singles off Frank Shellenbach as the Stars won the Saturday opener, 12-4 and added another single off Archie Campbell in the short nightcap, taken by Hollywood, 2 to 1. He nicked Tom Sheehan for a triple, double and single as the Star veteran hurled a 12-9 victory yesterday, and continued his batting streak with a single off Dumovich in the short second game, won by San Francisco, 5-4. Hollywood walked off with the series, 6 to 3.

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HIGH CLIMBER

When the race meeting opens on the new track at Gresham July 21, two Eugene horses will be ready for their first starts. They are Orphan Pat and Oregon Star, three-year old geldings owned by Mrs. Billy Nussbaum, wife of the Eugene fire department chief.

Orphan Pat is by Motor Cop out of Norfolk Rose while Oregon Star is by Motor Cop out of Gimble. Neither has been raced before and they are being schooled at Everett by M. M. Hoyt, former Eugene trainer. The horses have been breezed a few times but have done no serious running yet and Mrs. Nussbaum doesn't know what they will do in competition.

Being sons of Motor Cop, however, they stand a good chance of being winners. Motor Cop is famous in these parts as a first race, and no better blood line exists in the north-west. The Nussbaums have raised the horses and given them perfect treatment and perhaps this summer they will reap the reward of their efforts.

The Gresham race meeting will be staged by Peter Kyns who came here from Kansas City. The track has been enlarged from a half-mile to a 5-8 mile oval. Kyns is bringing his para mutuel machines here from Reno and between 200 and 250 horses that have followed Kyns' meets are being shipped in. The Nussbaums don't know what races they will start the youngsters in but say they'll get their first taste of competition sometime during the meet.

Eugene baseball fans should read this from a letter written to this department by Jim Nutter, business manager of the Salem Senators. Jim is asking for revenge since Eugene took that 12 inning victory over Salem. Says Nutter:

The double defeat reduced the Giants' lead over St. Louis to 3 1/2 games but the Brooklyn Dodgers kept things from becoming worse by dividing a twin bill with the Cardinals. A triple by Ralph Boyle with two aboard in the eleventh gave Brooklyn an 8-6 decision in the opener, but Tex Carleton turned in a seven-hit shutout and St. Louis won the second game, 2 to 0.

The Boston Braves' winning streak took them above the 500 mark for the first time this season as they won two close games from the Cincinnati Reds, 3-2 and 3-1. The first game went ten innings before a hit batsman and a couple of singles off Paul Derringer, produced the winning run. Wally Berger socked his 16th homer in the opener.

The Boston Red Sox and St. Louis Browns divided a doubleheader, the Sox winning the first contest 4-0 behind the five hit flinging of George Fingers and the Browns pounding out a 9-2 victory in the nightcap. Jim Leever, St. Louis shortstop, was injured in the opener when a pitched ball hit his arm.

Other major league clubs had an open date.

Rye Price Takes Jump; Wheat Up	
CHICAGO, July 10.—(AP)—Sensational jumps of more than eight cents a bushel in rye prices hoisted all deliveries of wheat to new high price records today.	
Waves of buying in the rye market were attributed to trade assertions for the new processing plant on wheat, taken with the price discount of rye compared with wheat, gave rye an advantage of upwards of 50 cents a bushel. This differential, many traders estimated, should stimulate a demand for rye flour, and materially reduce the comparatively small supply	

of rye. Rye closed flurried, 7 3/8 to 7 7/8 above yesterday's finish, wheat 3-4 to 1 3/4 up, corn 1 3/8 to 1 7/8 and vanced, oats at 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 gain, and provisions showing a rise of 27 to 53 cents.
