SPRINGFIELD, July 11.—(Spe-
cial)—An ordinance requiring a per-
mit from the city before buildings of
any kind are erected was passed by
the council at its monthly meeting
Monday evening. There will be no fee
for the permit, which may be obtain-
ed from the city recorder.
As protection against fire hazards,
the council also passed an ordinance
prohibiting commercial lumber or
wood yards to be located in territory
adjacent to the business district,
which was defined as being bounded by
Mill, Tenth and A streets and the
alley south of Main street.
Two hundred feet of fire hose will
be purchased by the city, following
authorization by the council. Bills
amounting to \$124.00 were also al-
lowed by the group.
