Missing Bullet Mystery Solved Here Wednesday

The mystery of the lost bullet has been solved! On Jan. 8, 1932, an unknown assailant entered the Garrett market at 1450 Thirteenth avenue east and held up the proprietor, E. W. Garrett, who, however, resisted being held up and decided to do something about it. Leaping over the counter, Garrett mived with the burglar in good old Greek and Roman style without the rules and as a result the would-be holdup turned into a free-for-all with the burglar quite anxious to make his way hither and thither, mostly thither.

Finally breaking free, the bandit fired one shot at Garrett, missed, and dashed out into the night and oblivion. But now comes the mystery. When police answered Garrett's call, they were unable to find any trace of the bullet. Police were politely nonplussed. Garrett was angrily non-plussed and the bullet just wasn't there.

Wednesday, while cleaning around the shop, Garrett happened to move a small show case resting atop another case and there, lodged between the two where it had rested all this time, was the bullet, which had gone through the case making a small hole in an obscure corner and had burrowed into the top of the lower case just enough to stop it from going further. Garrett hurriedly called the police to see the bullet "just to show 'em that guy had fired that shot I told 'em about."

At Cedar Flat

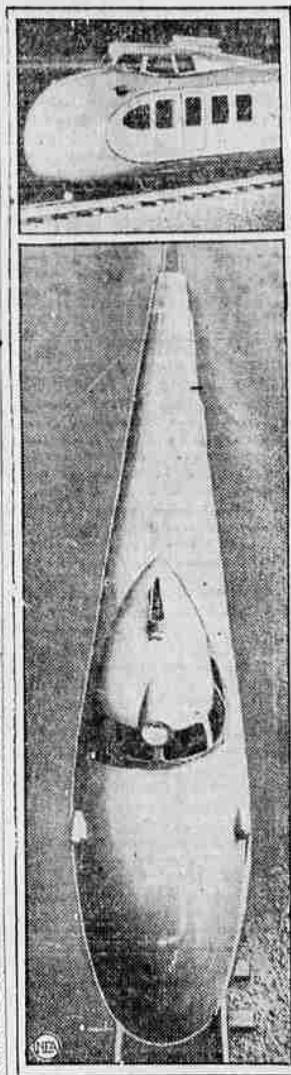

Dean Allen Will Talk to Assembly On Public Opinion

Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism of the University of Oregon, will address summer session students at the assembly Thursday morning at 11 o'clock in Villard hall on "The Battle of Public Opinion."

The address, which is open to townspeople and anyone else interested, will be a "chalk talk," during which Dean Allen will graphically outline "major campaigns." Dean Allen has made an intensive study in this field, and his talk is expected to be of special interest to those who wish to keep up-to-date in news happenings, and to those interested in history, economics and allied subjects.

Speakers for the remaining assemblies for the summer session were also announced today by Dr. Dan E. Clark, in charge of sessions here. Dean J. R. Jewell of the school of education will speak next Tuesday on "Democracy of Education." Dr. Joseph Schaffer, former professor of history here and now head of the Wisconsin State Historical Society, will speak on July 20. On July 25 Dr. Joseph Von Bradish of the College of the City of New York will speak on "Political and Cultural Aspects of Central Europe. Townspeople are invited to all the assemblies, which are held at 11 o'clock in Villard hall.
