SEAL OUTFIELDER GETS 47TH SAFETY TO THREATEN MARK

Los Angeles and Hollywood gained a notch on Sacramento and Portland in the opening games of their new series to make the championship race in the Pacific Coast league more exciting than at any period this season.

While Seattle beat the Senators, 4 to 3, and Oakland nosed out Portland, 3 to 2, Los Angeles advanced within a half game of second place and one game of the top by defeating San Francisco, 8 to 2. Hollywood cut its distance from the pinnacle to two games, by beating the Missions, 3 to 0.

Little Joe Demaggio, Sen's outfielder, hit safely in his 47th consecutive game when he lined a single to center in the third inning against Los Angeles, and reduced his margin of trying the record of Jack Ness, made in 1915, to two games.

The Indians are becoming the hardest team in the league for the Senators to beat. Page held the league leaders to six hits. Seattle scored two in the ninth to break a 2 to 2 deadlock. The Solons threatened to tie the score again in their half, but the best they could do was score one run.

The Oaks scored their winning run in the tenth when Werns singled, went to second on Devore's walk, and registered on Walsh's single. Besides winning his own ball game with the single, Walsh bested Turpin in a pitching duel, allowing 9 hits to his opponent's 10.

Vance Page shut out the Missions with six hits. The Stars scored their three runs in the sixth on four hits and a sacrifice.

McLemore's Sports Parade

NEW YORK, July 12.—(U.P.)—It is doubtful if the game of tennis ever will grip this nation as it does England where crowds of 30,000 are not uncommon and hundreds remain in line all night for standing room near a court on which an important match is scheduled. But it wouldn't be surprising to see all American attention records for the sport broken this year during the Wimbledon cup series and the men's and women's nationals at Forest Hills, and the west side club's spacious horsehoe stadium completely sold out for the first time.

The men's championship will boast a field second only to Wimbledon in class. Augmenting America's greatest players will be a host of foreign luminaries, including Jack Crawford, the mighty Australian who toppled Ellsworth Vines from his throne of world supremacy. Crawford will be accompanied by his Davis cup teammates, Vivian McGrath, Don Turnbull and Andrian Quist. McGrath, it will be remembered, is the youngster who created the two-hand backhand. England is certain to send a team, probably Bunny Austin and Fred Perry, and Japan's doughty little warriors, Jiro Satoh and Ryosaku Nunoi, are expected to be present. There is a chance that France will send Cochet or one of its younger stars.

A final round duel between the slug-stroking Crawford and the fluent Vines would pack the Forest Hills stadium from turf to top. So would a women's final between Mrs. Moody and Dorothy Round, the courageous little English girl who took a set from the world's champion at Wimbledon—the first set the great Moody had dropped since 1926 or her "appendicitis year." Such a match is entirely possible, for Miss Round, accompanied by five of England's greatest players—Betty Nuthall, Freda James, Mary Heeley, Peggy Scriven and Mrs. L. R. C. Mitchell—will sail for this country on Saturday.

Judging by the Wimbledon final Miss Round, who hits probably the hardest forehand drive in women's tennis, stands an excellent chance of bringing Mrs. Moody's long reign to an end. She was within one point of making the score 5-3 in the first set, and if she had gained that single point it is reasonable to believe she might well have gone on to win the match and give the sports world its biggest upset since David outwitted Goliath.

Miss Round has made the fastest progress of any woman tennis player in the business. One year ago she faced Mrs. Moody at Wimbledon and was able to win but one game. Last week she won 15 before bowing to the champion's superior courtship and stamina.

The championship is certain to see Helen Jacobs dethroned, for she never has won a tournament in which Mrs. Moody was entered and probably never will.

Featherweight of Seattle Defeated

SEATTLE, July 12.—(U.P.)—Freddie Miller dispelled any doubt as to his superiority in the featherweight ranks by knocking out Abie Israel, Seattle, in the fourth round of a scheduled 15-round bout before 8000 fans here last night.

The world's champion outfought his opponent from the start, pummeling the Jewish challenger with crushing left-handed blows.

The end came after 24 minutes of the fourth round. Israel, unsteady on his feet from a terrific beating in the first three rounds, went down for the count when Miller landed a solid left cross.

In the four round opener Pat O'Des, 126 pounds, Portland, decisively beat Jos Calder, 122, Seattle.

GIANTS' SLUMP MAY BE OVER AS FIELDER RETURNS

NEW YORK, July 12.—(U.P.)—They thought Rookie John Ryan was a pro-sever who had been in New York Giants' office on Jan. 23, and Secretary Jim Tierney almost threw him out.

Ryan made the mistake of coming down from his home at Lynn, Mass., and whipping out his signed contract under Tierney's nose, entirely unannounced. Nobody knew him.

But now everybody knows Blondie Ryan, the "fielding fool," and the Giants' front office and New York fans regard him as a baseball Moses whose scheduled return to the lineup at St. Louis today is expected to lead the Giants out of their disastrous slump.

That the National league leaders' pennant hopes should appear to rest upon a rookie shortstop, who has a sea-bottom batting average of .194, emphasizes the precariousness of baseball. But such seems to be the case.

Since Ryan received a 10-stitch spike gash in the right leg July 2 from Joe Medwick of the Cardinals, the Giants won only one game and lost seven straight.

Bill Terry's outfit achieved the crest of sloppy baseball yesterday by fumbling away a game to St. Louis, 2 to 1.

Chicago extended its winning streak to six games with a 6 to 2 win over Brooklyn, enabling the Cubs to replace Pittsburgh at third position. Boston humbled the Pirates 5 to 3.

The Phillies rose out of the cellar, dropping Cincinnati into the basement by beating the Reds, 2 to 1.

The rehabilitated New York Yankees advanced to within two games of the Washington Senators, American league leaders, by beating St. Louis, 5 to 4, while Washington lost to Chicago, 9 to 3.

Chicago hammered three Washington hurlers for 16 hits, including Evar Swanson's triple, double and two singles in four attempts.

Jimmy Fox and Max Bishop led the attack as Philadelphia beat Cleveland, 6 to 4, and Boston downed Detroit, 2 to 1.

AMERICANS LEAD CANADIAN TOURNEY

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 12.—(U.P.)—Jack Finger, San Francisco, entered the second round of the dominion championship at the Shagbush Golf club here today as one of the favorites to win the title from Gordon Taylor, Montreal.

The Californian turned in the low score in the opening round by defeating Ed Innes of Toronto. He shot 70, two under par, on his morning round and won the match on the 11th green in the afternoon round, 8 to 7.

The biggest upset was registered by Cecil Coville, Vancouver, who eliminated Dr. O. F. Willing of Portland, former American Walker cup player, on the 18th green. The match was hard fought, with the golfing dentist coming from behind three times to even the score. The youthful Coville led on one hole lead on the 17th.

Besides Finger, four other Americans survived the first round. Frank Dolp, Portland, beat Jim Bell, Vancouver, 6 and 6; Albert Campbell, Seattle, beat Stan Leonard, Vancouver, 6 and 5; Harry Givan, Seattle, beat Mac O'Neill, Vancouver, 11 and 10, and Dr. Cliff Baker, Portland, defeated H. Nicholls, Pendleton, B. C. 4 and 3.

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HIGHCLIMBER takes km over

Red-blooded sports fans of the west will assemble at Portland, July 21 to have a hand in Oregon's turf revival, signalling the return of an industry made almost extinct some 39 years ago by laws taboing wagering on the performance of the thoroughbreds.

The west is admirably suited for the breeding of thoroughbred race horses and the industry is expected to flourish, now that California has added her approval to that already furnished by the legislatures of Oregon and Washington.

William P. Kyne, popular western sportsman and turf promoter, will be at the helm at the 20-day meeting which begins the third week in July at Gresham fair grounds, 14 miles from Portland. He was represented in Eugene this week by two members of his staff, Ed Barlow and J. D. Blair, who told of the migration of more than 100 thoroughbreds and scores of attendants from the meeting which Kyne has just completed in Kansas City, to Portland.

"Spend your vacation in Portland," is the slogan of the turf travelers who will aid Kyne in conducting the coming season. They report interest all along the way in the turf revival and say Kyne expects the west to forge to the front on the nation's turf map, now that the people have

In the egg list under New York classifications, firsts were boosted to 15 cents and crax to 11 cents, buying prices.

The forecast boost on wholesale prices of eggs of Tuesday went into effect Wednesday morning.

Other Lists Steady
All other lists in the market here remained unchanged for Wednesday. With appearance of a few outdoor cucumbers from other points in Oregon, the hot-house cucumber season will be over in about two or three weeks.

Chase Gardens say they will have the hot-house ones for at least another two weeks. The production this year has been heavier than for last.

The hot-house tomatoes will be coming in still for another three weeks or so, according to Chase Gardens. A big quantity of these has been supplied to Eugene and other markets on the coast this season, the tomatoes bringing a good price.
