

THREE DAY DRIVE WILL BE STAGED FOR 3-C BENEFIT

Plans for a three-day drive to supply games, used athletic equipment, playing cards, books and magazines to the 3-C camps in the Eugene district were outlined Tuesday afternoon at a meeting of the Welfare league in the Eugene hotel.

Mrs. Frank Jenkins was appointed chairman of the drive committee by Mrs. Augusta Godfrey, general chairman of the 3-C welfare organization. The group, inspired by Governor Julius Meier of Oregon is sponsored locally by the Welfare league and proposed to aid in welfare and recreational work among the Civilian Conservation Corps camps in the Eugene district.

The three day drive will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 20, 21, and 22. Sports equipment, games, old magazines, books, used playing cards and everything that will be of value in the 3-C camps is asked. "There are undoubtedly many people in Eugene who have old sports equipment such as boxing gloves, tennis rackets, baseball bats and gloves and other paraphernalia of this nature who will be glad to donate them to the camps," says Mrs. Jenkins, drive chairman. "We are particularly desirous of sports equipment, used playing cards, games such as jigsaw puzzles, and good reading matter. We feel sure that everyone will co-operate with us in this work which will help prove to the 3-C men from other states that Oregon is not lacking in hospitality."

Father Francis P. Leipzig of St. Mary's Catholic church was present at the meeting and offered the use of the parish hall as a clearing house for the magazines and equipment. Capt. Paul McD. Robinson, who represented Major Charles Corlett, district commander, at the meeting, promised to have a man on hand at the hall during the three days to take care of the equipment as it is brought in.

The material will be sorted at the hall and the army trucks from the 22 camps in the Eugene district will stop there and carry the supplies out to the camps.

A number of matters were taken up at the meeting. Father Leipzig was appointed chairman of a committee to supply speakers who will visit the various camps and give short, interesting talks on various phases of forest life, Oregon history and other points of interest to the men from other parts of the country.

The group will petition Governor Meier to establish a special \$1 license fee for 3-C men who wish to fish during the balance of the season. The \$3 fee is out of reach for most of the men who have but \$5 a month to spend, and the group went on record as favoring the lower fee for members of the Civilian Conservation Corps.

It was pointed out that a \$1 fee would prevent the streams from being thrown open indiscriminately but would give those who seriously desire to fish a chance to enjoy one of Oregon's most famous recreational advantages.
