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CURFEW LAW WILL BE ENFORCED HERE

Authorities Say Parents To Blame For Most Juvenile Crime

Curfew shall ring tonight—in theory at least—and every other night in Eugene, it was decreed Friday by Chief of Police Carl Bergman and Judge Errol Fisk in his capacity as juvenile judge in a move designed to curb increasing petty crimes committed by rampant youth.

Strict enforcement of the existing city ordinance providing that all persons under the age of 16 be off the city streets by 9:30 o'clock from May 1 to Aug. 31 and by 9 o'clock the rest of the year was ordered by Chief Bergman Friday.

"During the past week, three boys from Eugene have been sent to the reform school and two others were committed and paroled," Chief Bergman stated in announcing his intention of putting the old curfew ordinance into full effect. "The number of boys getting into trouble has been increasing at an alarming rate of recent months and it is high time something was done to put a stop to it."

In estimating that at least 50 per cent of the juvenile crime is due to parents, the city ordinance was passed.

Suspended Sheriff Testifies For Self

MEDFORD, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—Suspended-Sheriff Gordon L. Schermerhorn, on trial in circuit court, charged with ballot theft, took the stand in his own behalf this morning.

It is now expected that the closing arguments in the case will start by Saturday noon, and that the case will be in the hands of the jury Saturday nightfall. Schermerhorn, it is anticipated will be on the stand the balance of the day.

SNATCHERS! FOR NEW LIST 'GO-BETWEENS'

Gangsters, Beer Truckers Are Proposed For Negotiators

O'CONNELL HELD SAFE

Luer Relatives Receive Ransome Notes But Question Source

ALBANY, N. Y., July 14.—(AP)—Johnny O'Connell is alive and well—his family expressed this belief today after receiving a note signed by the kidnapped 21-year-old nephew of the politically powerful O'Connell brothers.

The note addressed to the missing youth's uncle, Dan, directed the O'Connells to submit a new list of intermediaries, the 22 Albany men offered as negotiators having been rejected by the kidnapers.

Gangster On List
While the note—the first received since Tuesday—bearing the authentic signature of John J. O'Connell, Jr., brought relief and joy to the family and the city in general, it transferred temporarily at least, interest in the abduction to New York City where the names of the new go-betweens was published.

A variegated collection of nine names, in groups of three, appeared today in three New York City afternoon papers. In one of the lists the top name was Sylvester Hess, who was with Jack "Legs" Diamond a few minutes before the gangster was slain here more than a year and a half ago.

Contents Not Revealed
The new negotiators include two former beer truck drivers, two operators of beer gardens, two beer distributors, the proprietor of a New York City speakeasy, a race track habitue and a former stage hand.

The O'Connells refused to divulge the contents of today's note, but told close friends that the general tone of the message indicated that young O'Connell was alive and in good health.

This fresh word from the kidnapers brought remarks from some authorities.

Elliott Roosevelt Files Papers For Divorce in Nevada

MINDEN, Nev., July 14.—(AP)—Elliott Roosevelt, second son of the president, filed suit here today for a divorce from Elizabeth Donner Roosevelt, of Philadelphia. His complaint charged extreme cruelty.

The case will not be heard before Monday when Mrs. Roosevelt is expected to come into court with a cross-complaint and ask that the decree be awarded to her.

In that event Elliott will present no evidence in support of his complaint, while his wife's testimony will be read into the record from a deposition that is to be dispatched from Philadelphia by airmail today.

Roosevelt will be the only witness, and he will testify only as to his residence in Nevada.

Groups to Discuss Civic Improvement

Representatives of civic organizations of the city will meet at the Eugene chamber of commerce Monday night at 7:45 o'clock to discuss a program of obtaining federal loans for civic improvement work in Eugene. A. L. Williamson, chairman of the Eugene Building Congress committee on civic improvement, has called the meeting.

Projects for which federal funds may be sought include a sewage disposal plant, repairs to the city hall and possibly a natorium for the city River View park.

Representatives of the various service clubs, women's clubs, civic organizations and the city council have been invited to the meeting.

Escaped Con Killed Trying Bank Robbery

PARSONS, Kas., July 14.—(AP)—A bank robber identified by officers as Kenneth Conn, one of eleven prisoners who escaped from the Kansas penitentiary May 30, was shot to death today in an attempted bank holdup at Altamont. A companion, seriously wounded, was identified as Alva Payton, another fugitive.

Sheriff W. C. Miller of LaBette county said Payton had admitted his identity and told him his companion was Conn. Payton was sent to the penitentiary for robbing the Edna State bank, not far from Altamont.

The two men were shot down by Isaac McCarty, cashier of the LaBette County State bank, from an ambush he had prepared on top of the bank vault for use in case of robbery. The first blast from his shotgun struck Conn in the body. Payton was shot in the face.

The cashier's suspicions were aroused as the two men approached the bank. He retired to his prepared ambush, hidden from the robbers by a curtain through which he could observe them.

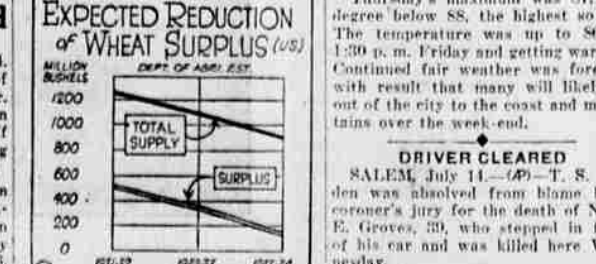
Mattern Plans To Finish Solo World Journey

CHICAGO, July 14.—(AP)—Despite injuries and the exposure that followed the crash of his plane in Siberia, Jimmie Mattern is determined to complete alone a flight around the world. In a cable to S. J. Sackett, one of his backers, Mattern today outlined a plan of traveling as a passenger in a Soviet plane from Anadyr, Siberia, where he was stranded, to Nome, Alaska.

At Nome he would obtain a plane taken there by a relief expedition headed by William Alexander of New York, fly back to Anadyr, and at that point turn about and complete the globe trip.

MOSCOW, July 14.—(AP)—The Tass (Russian) News Agency announced today that Pilot Levantovsky hopped off from Khabarovsk in Eastern Siberia yesterday morning for Anadyr to pick up James Mattern, the American aviator, stranded there.

PARLEY WILL TAKE RECESS ON JULY 27

Steering Committee Votes For Action Keeping Tariff Truce

CENTRAL BANKS TOPIC

Factors Objected To By Federal Reserve Eliminated

LONDON, July 14.—(AP)—The steering committee of the world economic conference decided today to recess the world-wide parley on July 27.

All committees were notified to have their complete reports ready by next Friday.

The full bureau meeting will be conducted the following Tuesday and the final plenary session will be held the 27th.

Tariff Truce Continued
It is understood that great care will be taken to avoid a note of finality at the plenary session. There will be a clear indication that the conference is expected to resume at a future date. This attitude would permit continuation of the tariff truce which was for the duration of the parley and which many nations desire not to terminate.

The plenary session will have to confirm the steering committee's decision to close out the deliberations but leaders consider this a mere formality.

Senator James Couzens of Michigan was the center of interest today in a private meeting of the subcommittee which is considering the question of commercial indebtedness.

Central Banking Talked
It was understood the senator expressed disgust at the lack of progress and declared that the subcommittee might as well adjourn.

James M. Cox of Ohio then called his colleague aside for a few minutes' confidential talk, after which Mr. Couzens withdrew his remark.

The monetary subcommittee on permanent measures adopted this afternoon the following resolution which had already been approved unanimously by a subcommittee:

"The conference considers it essential in order to provide an international gold standard with the necessary mechanism for satisfaction."

7 Negro Tree Troopers Held On Riot Charge

ALBANY, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—Seven negro members of the Quartzville camp, Civilian Conservation Corps, in the Willamette national forest near Lebanon, were in jail here today as the result, police said, of a disturbance at the camp. Walter Watkins, one of the workers, was charged with assault and the other six were held on charges of disorderly conduct.

Police said the disturbance started last night during a safety demonstration at the camp by representatives of a power company. Watkins, the officers said, threatened to break up the meeting and tried to strike the camp physician.

Sheriff's deputies on guard at the camp prevented what they said threatened to be a riot. Seventeen negro workers were taken to the jail at Lebanon, where state troopers helped keep the men in custody. Ten of the men were later released, and the remaining seven brought to the more spacious jail here. District Attorney Shanks of Lane county said tonight the cases would be prosecuted by the civil authorities.

LOG HAULERS ARE GRANTED RESPITE

Truckers Operate Under Old Law Pending Case Decision

Log haulers of Lane county received assurance they would not be forced out of business through operation of the newly enacted state truck law Friday with word that Public Utilities Commissioner Charles Thomas has issued an order to the state police not to molest log haulers for the time being.

The order holds pending outcome of the injunction which has been filed against the act and which will be argued before the supreme court sometime in the future.

The action greatly relieves a tense situation developing in Lane county, involving many small mills which depend on trucks for their log supply to continue operation, it was declared. Word of the commissioner's action was received here by Charles Sigman, who has been aiding the truck owners in their negotiations with the state.

With the new law held up, truck owners have only to comply with the old law which required them to obtain a \$10 permit from the state highway commission, the regular state license and to post a \$1000 bond with the commission if they haul over state highways. If they haul over county roads, they are required to post a bond with the county court, the amount to be determined by the court.

Truck owners, headed by Fred Walters, conferred with Carl Washburn.

IRRIGATION PROJECTS APPROVED

Ickes Announces Public Works Jobs Totaling \$115,000,000

WILL EMPLOY MILLION

Indian Service and Federal Bureaus Get Share Of Vast Sum

WASHINGTON, July 14.—(AP)—Allocations by states of the \$50,000,000 fund for forest, park and Indian roads under the public works fund was announced today by the public works administration.

The distribution, including nearly every state in the union, included:

Oregon \$4,275,540; Arizona \$4,388,990; California \$7,798,017; Idaho \$1,068,415; Montana \$3,611,103; Nevada \$1,483,238; Utah \$1,878,846; Washington \$3,603,526.

The Oregon share of today's allocations was divided as follows: Forest highways, \$2,185,448; forest roads, \$1,068,415; park roads, \$532,850; Indian roads, \$355,000; public land highways, \$385,141.

MAKE MILLION JOBS
WASHINGTON, July 14.—(AP)—The public works administration today told how it intended to distribute \$115,513,610 as the first step in a program to create a million new jobs by Oct. 1.

That \$115,513,610, Secretary Ickes announced, will be portioned out this way: \$64,361,542 for federal public works; \$50,000,000 for roads in parks, forests, Indian reservations and public lands; \$952,068 for municipal water and sewer plants.

These brought to \$753,513,610 the total allocated from the \$3,300,000,000 fund made available less than a month ago. Already, President Roosevelt had approved this expenditure of \$238,000,000 on naval construction and \$400,000,000 on highways. An

OREGON RELIEF IS ALLOTTED \$452,000

WASHINGTON, July 14.—(AP)—Three western states today were granted a total of \$1,200,070 for emergency relief work.

Harry L. Hopkins, federal emergency director, announced he had allotted \$769,813 to Washington; \$47,204 to Nevada and \$452,053 to Oregon. The grants were made on the basis of one federal dollar for three dollars of public expenditure for relief in the state during the second quarter of the year.

Washington has received a total of \$1,713,647; Nevada \$70,403 and Oregon \$1,022,618 for the new relief fund since disbursement started.
