

REPEAL LEAGUE FILES ACCOUNT SHOWING COSTS

SALEM, Ore., July 14.—(U.P.)—Preliminary account of contributions and expenses on referendum against the remaining sections of the state dry law was filed today by George Bylander, Portland, representing the Oregon Repeal league.

Bylander said \$2,513.18 was contributed by 18 firms and individuals. It was spent in circulating petitions, he said. The league has done no campaigning for the repeal. A new law requires filing expense accounts of proponents and opponents of measures between 5 and 10 days before an election.

Final expense account must be filed following the election as previously.

"Klondike Kate", Sourdough Sweetheart Will Get Hitched

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 14.—(U.P.)—A secret romance born on Christmas eve in 1900, in the gold rush days at Dawson—with long years of absence from each other since—brings marriage to "Klondike Kate" Rockwell of Bend, Ore., the belle of the dance halls, and John Matson, an Alaskan miner.

The silver-haired Matson, who remained in the northland working his claims but all the time recalling the vision of Kate, was at the boat dock this morning to meet her on her arrival from Seattle. They will be wed "within a day or so."

"We've corresponded the past four years," he said, "and two weeks ago she came to Vancouver to meet me. 'Now we'll go back to Alaska, together!'"

In the long years of separation, Klondike Kate came south with Alexander Pantages, the theater man, and won renown through the west as the girl who gave him his start in the theatrical world. She married also and in 1914 "homesteaded" it in the high desert country of central Oregon.

Matson had a few meetings with her in Alaska, after he first saw her

in the old Savoy theater at Dawson that Christmas eve. He was among the miners who admired the colorful dance hall girl, and chose her for a sweetheart, but kept the secret to himself.

In 1902, she left Alaska, while Matson remained in the north. In recent years, he has had claims on Matson creek, in the Lawson country of Alaska.

In the newspapers four years ago, he saw that she had attended the Seattle stampede of the sourdoughs, and later that she was the "mystery witness summoned from Bend, Ore., to aid in the defense of Pantages in his California trial, although she was not called to testify.

He started a correspondence with her, and she welcomed his attentions. Finally, he asked her to marry him. "I want to take care of you, and make you happy," he wrote.

Their honeymoon will be back in Alaska, the land where they both first met, when they were young.

Wrestler's Number Was Up; Is Killed When Auto Crashes

EUTAW, Ala., July 14.—(U.P.)—The death of George Kotsosaros in a private automobile accident near here closed a story-book career the Greek wrestler pursued on the theory that "when a man's number is up, it's up."

Educated in Athens Kotsosaros fought in the Balkan war of 1912 against the Turks and saw comrades fall on all sides.

"Don't worry," he would say, "when a man's number is up, it's up."

It wasn't up for Kotsosaros in the Balkan war and it wasn't up when he got caught in a street fight in Cairo between Mohammedans and Christians. He was wounded by the Turks but recovered.

In his career in the ring and the movies, Kotsosaros had his nose smashed, was in many bad falls and in an airplane crash—but his number wasn't up.

A wrestler couldn't fill a date in Nashville, Tenn., this week and Kotsosaros substituted. He was driving to New Orleans with John Paul Jones, Texas wrestler, yesterday.

The car skidded in gravel and overturned. Jones was seriously injured. Kotsosaros, who police believe went to sleep at the wheel, was killed. His number was up.

Salt Creek Timber Survey Is Started

Possible sales of large tracts of government timber in the Salt creek area in the Willamette national forest above Oakridge are indicated in a survey of the timber which the forest service will at once institute in that section.

H. G. Hopkins of the school of forestry at the Washington State college at Pullman, who is to be foreman of the crew of cruisers, was in Eugene Thursday conferring with officials of the Willamette forest, and expected to leave at once for the scene of operation. He will have a crew of eight or ten men and they will work out of the Civilian Conservation Corps camps at Oakridge.

The cruise will cover an area of several thousand acres and it is expected that the work will be carried on several months.

Data on the amount of timber in the area, the condition of the terrain on which it is located and other information to be used when time comes

to sell the timber will be obtained on the cruise. There is a vast amount of valuable timber in the Salt creek area and it is said that some of the best in the entire Willamette forest is growing there.
