A suit of clothes was made in three hours and four minutes from the time the sheep was sheared in Yorkshire, England, in 1931.

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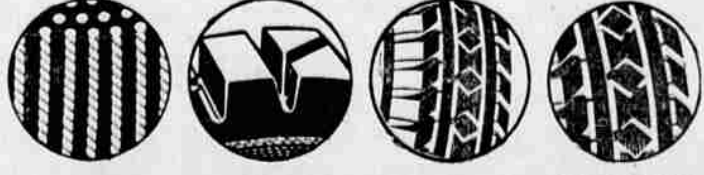
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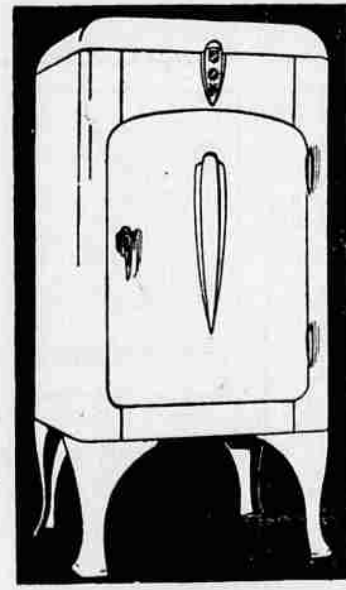


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
