

EGGS SELLING AT EXTREME PRICES

PORTLAND, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—Liberal withdrawals from storage are confined in the local egg trade. Much short held stock of inferior quality—hot weather stock—is reported on the market, creating more or less difficulty in marketing.

Quality eggs are finding a very good sale and generally at the extreme price limits according to trade leaders. Lay is still decreasing at most coast points while demand is fully maintained.

Market for butter reflects a fully steady tone generally but without price change on the open trade. Butterfat remains firm.

Much better general demand is showing for live chickens here with improving conditions continued in the south. Higher prices are being named for top quality country killed calves at 8c extreme. Hogs are steady while there is a growing call for beef. Liberal demand is showing in the market for country killed lambs and especially quality offerings which are selling up to 12c lb. Market for mutton suggests a steady tone. Demand for raspberries for home canning continues to gain and prices are firmer to higher. Currants are also being sought. Only a fair call is showing for blackcaps. There is very little call for youngberries.

WOOL MARKET IS REPORTED HIGHER

BOSTON, July 14.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The market is a bit higher again this week for wool. Buying by the mills has been less eager but there is interest still of fair proportions and sufficient to have caused a further mark-up in wool prices. It would seem, however, as if the market might have reached a point where prices might pause in their upward movement, although the outlook for the more remote futures seems to favor

higher prices even than those now prevailing. "Wool is being consumed in large quantities at the moment and the manufacturers are hurrying deliveries as much as possible in line with the requests of their customers who want to take the earliest possible advantage of the fall and winter trade in clothing. The test of the market will come then, when the ultimate consumer reveals his buying interest.

"Foreign markets are very firm, although the upward movement in prices across the Atlantic appears to have come to pause for the moment. "In the west, there is comparatively little wool left for sale and buyers are returning in increasing numbers to the east. EXTORTION CONFESSED

HOOD RIVER, July 14.—(AP)—J. E. Cozad, former Hood River orchardist, was held here today on a charge of attempting to obtain money by threats, after police announced last night that he had confessed sending an extortion letter to C. Dethman, a banker, threatening death unless \$10,000 was delivered at an isolated place east of the city.
