EXCHANGE TAKES LEAD OF GRAINS AND MAKES GAINS

NEW YORK, July 15.—(AP)—Financial markets took on renewed hope today as wheat prices again soared and business news continued highly cheerful. Stocks, a bit irregular at first, rallied under the leadership of specialties and closed firm with many gains ranging from 1 to 3 or more points. Trading volume was not pronounced, transfers approximating 2,600,000 shares.

Strength of metal, sugar and alcohol stocks caused traders to relax some of their recent caution, although there was no real rush for equities.

The dollar held around its yesterday's rates in foreign exchange.

The freight car loadings report for the week ended July 8, had little effect on carrier shares. The decrease of 94,541 was quite in line with expectations as was the gain of 122,295 over the same week in 1932.

TWO NEW YORK TEAMS HEADED TOWARD SERIES

The hopes of New York's fans for a world's series on a five cent fare were somewhat brighter today for the Yankees were back in a virtual tie with Washington for the American league lead while the Giants, recovering from a slump, had increased their margin in the National to four full games.

Both New York teams pounded to victory yesterday. The Yanks, bunched seven hits for eight runs in one inning, trounced the St. Louis Browns 11 to 6 to run their winning streak to seven games and draw to within four percentage points of the Senators. The Giants slugged it out with the St. Louis Cardinals and although out-hit, won their third in a row, 12-7.

Chicago's White Sox and the veteran southpaw, Walter Miller, took care of Washington for the Yanks, defeating the league leaders for the third time in four days, 4 to 0. Miller allowed only three hits and didn't let a runner reach third in scoring his second victory of the series.

The Giants disposed of the fourth place Cardinals themselves, pounding Dizzy Dean from the hill in the fifth inning while Brooklyn and Boston saw to it that the other first division clubs of the national league, the Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates, were defeated.

The Dodgers, aided by Chicago errors, scored a 5-3 victory over the Cubs.

Boston's Braves had to go ten innings in a duel between Fred Frankhouse and Larry French before Habit Maraville singled in the run that gave them a 4-3 decision.

The Phillies moved safely away from the National league cellar by defeating the Cincinnati Reds 6 to 0 behind the five hit flinging of Austin Moore.

In the other American league games the Philadelphia Athletics downed the Cleveland Indians 3-2 when Bing Miller swatted a home run with two on in the eighth and the Detroit Tigers hammered George Pigeas and Johnny Welch of the Boston Red Sox for 13 hits to win 8 to 3.

BUTTER AND EGGS SHOWING STRENGTH

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—There was continued strength in the market for cube butter at the week-end.

Butterfat retains its liberal strength.

Trade in eggs continues to gain strength locally as well as along the coast generally. Late receipts continue their decrease. Prices are being maintained for quality.

Demand for chickens is now steady here. Prices are unchanged to a fraction better in spots with all sorts cleaning up. Turkeys continue out of market generally with demand good.

There is an acute shortage of quality lettuce throughout the country and especially the smaller sizes which are bringing a premium in the east. The market is well supplied with poor to ordinary stuff.

There is a very drabgy tone in the pea market and prices continue low. Shipping call is not very good on account of both the low price available and the very warm weather which is hurting consumer sales.

Very good demand for raspberries is showing locally with prices steady to firm at the week-end. Currants are also in call with prices held up. Strawberries are slow with little offer. Blackcaps are in fair call.

Market for potatoes is holding fairly well locally as to price while demand is good. Home grown stock is increasing and quality is unusually good.
