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Meat Dealers Of Oregon Gather Here To Consider Fair Competition Code; Form Organization, Outline Objectives

Organization of the Oregon Retail Meat Dealers' association and adoption of a state-wide code of fair business competition will be effected here Sunday at a meeting at the Osburn hotel starting at noon. Representatives of meat dealers from all sections of the state will be here for the meeting which is being sponsored by the Eugene Retail Meat Dealers' association. Harold F. Allen, vice-president of the local association, will preside in the absence of Ben Perlich, president, who has been called out of town.

A tentative code of fair competition has been drafted and will be considered at the meeting. The code provides for a minimum wage scale of \$16 per week with a maximum of 50 hours per week of labor.

Provisions of the code are designed to "make effective the National Industrial Recovery act by increasing employment, improving the standards of labor, eliminating destructive competition and increasing the purchasing power of the nation."

Objectives of the state-wide association include 15 points tentatively outlined as follows: prohibit false advertising, prohibit use of advertised brands as loss leaders, require licenses for handling meat, limit number of licenses issued, prohibit unrelated lines handling meat, prohibit one line of business from encroaching upon another, put meat industry on a cash basis, promote a uniform meat inspection law, slaughter all retail animals in government inspected houses, stabilize wholesale prices, prohibit "dumping" practices, eliminate high cost small deliveries, wholesale meat selling confined to licensed retail meat dealers, promote a national meat program, recommend new grading system.

The code of fair competition provides for fair trade practices and legislation against false advertising and other listed unfair practices. Following is the tentative code to be considered Sunday:

1. Definitions: A retail meat market as used herein is defined to mean a place of business equipped with cases where meat may be kept under cover and properly refrigerated; running water; proper scales; meat slicing and grinding machines and other equipment required by city and state sanitary inspection laws. A licensed meat dealer is defined as one who has been issued a Class A or Class B license according to Oregon laws.

2. On and after the effective date the minimum wage that shall be paid by employers in the retail meat industry to any of their employees—except apprentices—shall be at the rate of \$16.00 per week.

3. The working hours per week shall not exceed 50 hours and no employee shall work more than 8 hours in any one day.

4. The work is being submitted as a program to utilize the \$30,000 obtained from federal funds for expenditure within the city of Eugene. The money will be handled by the state highway commission and plans for the work must obtain their approval as well as the approval of the bureau of public roads.

5. Maintenance work on the highway includes widening of East Broadway between Hilyard and Alder to make the street uniform in width. An increase of six feet in width of the street there is needed, Clubb declared. Other maintenance work on this street between Willamette and Franklin boulevard would be included.

6. On the west side, plans call for surfacing the highway on West Sixth street with non-skid material from Willamette to Blair boulevard.

7. Surveys have been completed and the engineer's office is working on estimates of the cost, expecting to have them completed in time for submission Wednesday, Clubb stated Saturday.

8. Clubb also has plans to submit to a meeting of civic organizations called at the chamber of commerce Monday night at 7:45 o'clock for the purpose of discussing what civic improvements could be made with the aid of federal funds, if any were available.

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SNATCHERS GET WRONG VICTIM; PAID RANSOM CAPTURED

Californian Is Mistaken
For Employer; Held
Since Thursday

LUEER THOUGHT ALIVE

O'Connell's Refuse To Aid
Officers; Chicago
Starts War

One kidnap victim was released yesterday when his captors found he was not the wealthy rancher they had mistaken him for, another extortion plot involving a kidnap threat was frustrated, and new measures were taken to stop abductions as efforts continued to release two victims still in the hands of captors.

E. T. Wiggins, 70, was found near Arcata, Calif., after being held since Thursday by a group of men who mistook him for W. Q. Wright, wealthy rancher. Wiggins told his story to authorities at Eureka, Calif., where he was taken by passing motorists. He said his abduction had planned to ask \$50,000 ransom for Wright.

Lineer Thought Alive
Three sons of Alton Luer, wealthy, Alton, Ill., resident, were understood to be raising funds for his ransom. Relatives were cheered by announcement of agents they designated to negotiate with the abductors that Luer, a frequent sufferer from heart attacks, was believed still alive. He was kidnaped Monday night.

At Albany, N. Y., District Attorney John T. Delaney said the family of John O'Connell, Jr., kidnaped scion of a politically powerful democratic clan, had declined to cooperate with him. The uncle and father of the 24 year old national guard officer have indicated that they could not aid officials for fear the kidnapers would carry out threats to slay the young man. Delaney planned a further conference with the O'Connells and said he would ask for all the evidence including four notes from the captors.

Chicago Starts Drive
At New York, two men who attempted to obtain \$10,000 from Dr. Jacob Wachman, Brooklyn physician under threat of kidnapping were seized in a police trap by use of a decoy package of bills.

Commissioner of Police James P. Allman of Chicago acting with State's Attorney Thomas J. Courtney, announced formation of a special squad of 40 detectives who will act under orders to "shoot to kill at the least resistance" in an effort to stamp out kidnaping.

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Flames Destroy
Terry Home Here
Saturday Night

Fire which spread rapidly throughout the entire structure destroyed the house occupied by Walter A. Terry at 1763 Hilyard street Saturday night. The fire of undetermined origin, started about 9:30 o'clock.

Quick work on the part of the fire department saved two adjoining buildings as sparks and flames leaping from the house started small fires in the structures. A small blaze started in the house moving plant of George Lammer, on the north side of the flaming house, but it was quickly extinguished.

The house was a mass of flames when firemen arrived and none of the house furnishings was saved. Several hundred persons, attracted by the fire, gathered to watch the flames battle the flames. There was no estimate of the damage.

The house belonged to a Springfield man whose name was not learned.

ELECTION TO GET BUT LIGHT VOTE

Interest In Measures Not
To Draw More Than
50 Per Cent

Notwithstanding the widespread interest in the question of the repeal of the 18th amendment and in the sales tax measure, it is expected that not more than a 40 per cent normal vote, or 50 per cent normal vote at the most, will be cast at the special election in Lane county July 21. This is the opinion of political observers at the courthouse who have for years handled the ballots at regular and special elections.

Special elections, it was stated, never draw anywhere near a full vote, no matter how many vital issues are to be voted upon. There is never the interest manifested in such an election as there is in a general election, even when it is not a presidential election year.

Besides voting on the candidates for the repeal convention, the amendment to the United States constitution repealing the 18th amendment and the sales tax measure, the voters will have the privilege of deciding on an amendment to the soldiers' bonus law, a county manager form of government, a law to prosecute by information instead of by grand jury action, a municipal debt and taxation law amendment, state power fund bonds, repeal of the Oregon prohibition law and the oleomargarine tax bill.

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Three Hop Off To Circle Globe; Two Without Sanction

NEW YORK, July 15.—(AP)—Wiley Post, bound around the world for a second time and two Lithuanian fliers who hopped off at dawn for their native land without governmental sanction, were racing across the Atlantic tonight.

A plane believed to be that of the stock Oklahoma City aviator was reported at 1:10 p. m., heading out over the Atlantic from Torbay, Newfoundland. He is due in Berlin, his first scheduled stop, between 5 a. m. and noon tomorrow.

The Lithuanians, Stephen Darlus and Stanley Gienas of Chicago, made a surprise start in their orange and black monoplane at 5:24 a. m., an hour and 14 minutes after Post had taken off.

The two world war veterans began their projected 4,000 mile flight without passports and without permission to fly over or to land in any country along their course. At 1:45 p. m., a ship tonight thought to be theirs passed over Clarenceville, Trinity Bay, Newfoundland.

O. and C. Grant
Funds To Be Held
Up, Says Attorney

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—Decision relative to the payment of claims of 18 Oregon counties to O and C Grant land money in lieu of taxes will be withheld 30 to 60 days, until the claims of the several counties can be certified by the secretary of the interior to the comptroller general, District Attorney Guy Gordon announced here this morning.

Attorney Gordon arrived in Roseburg today from Washington, D. C., where he and County Judge Moses of Benton county represented the grant land counties in a presentation of the claims before the comptroller general.

Payment has been withheld by the federal government under the contention that the money cannot be paid from the general fund, but must come from the special O and C fund, made up from timber sales, rentals and grazing fees, which fund is not sufficient to meet the claims.

CHAMBER VOTES TO SET ASIDE SECTIONS

County Group Would Save
Heceta Head Strips
Along Highway

A resolution endorsing the move to set aside Heceta point and the sea lions cave there as a national monument and to set aside tracts as wilderness to preserve the beauty of the highway sections with their rhododendrons and other growth, was voted at the meeting of the Lane county chamber of commerce in Florence, Saturday.

A committee is to be named from the chamber to take the matter up with congress.

A large crowd attended the county chamber meeting. The sea food dinner was a big feature and plans were made to sponsor a big clam feed in the fall at the opening of the Siuslaw highway.

Hans Peterson of Florence talked on the work of creating interests throughout the county in the port of Siuslaw and also in the cut-off through Walton. The matters were referred to the roads committee of the chamber.

It was pointed out that the government has funds for all ports that can be allotted as soon as traffic develops. The expense is all from the federal government, none coming from the county and state. More interest in the Siuslaw port should therefore be expressed, it was said.

Senator Miller of Marshfield praised Lane county for its interest in the coast highway, pointing out that no other section had taken as much interest in its stretch of the coast highway. He likewise spoke on the cooperation from the valley with the coast section and praised such cooperation.

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INDUSTRY IN LINE NOW TO AID RECOVERY

Volunteer Effort Made In
Various Fields For
New Set-Up

CODES BEING FORMED

Steel And Textile Companies
Draft Plans To Enforce
Regulations

WASHINGTON, July 15.—(AP)—A surge of volunteer effort by industry, which brought steel within its sheep, today edged closer to realization. President Roosevelt's desire to increase the purchasing power of the masses without delay.

Shortly after the steel industry had come forward with the draft of a plan to govern competition within that business, putting into immediate effect raises in the wages of tens of thousands of workers, Hugh S. Johnson, the recovery administrator, received from underwear manufacturers a conditional agreement to abide by the competitive plan of cotton textile mills until a separate underwear agreement could be drawn up.

Effective Monday
The cotton textile code goes into effect Monday. The underwear men, who operate a large share of the country's knitting mills, informed Johnson that subject of ratification by the various operators, the ban on child labor, the 40-hour work week and 80-hour machine week, and the \$12 and \$13 minimum wage levels of cotton would be assumed by the pending action on their own agreement.

Already rayon and silk manufacturers have asked authority to take such action, and a formal order is due tomorrow night or Monday approving this. Wool men, who filed a 40-hour code today with bottom wage levels of \$13 in the south and \$14 in the north, were expected to come in on the volunteer move.

Cement Group Joins
The cement industry also has taken voluntary steps to boost wages and spread employment by cutting working hours.

Johnson sent a telegram to Governor Ely of Massachusetts urging suspension of his state's "six o'clock closing law." That act forbids the employment of women after six o'clock as far as cotton mills are concerned. Under the textile code mills will have
