

MANY PICNICS

HELD IN LANE DURING SUNDAY

Sunday was picnic day in the Lane county section. The annual Mohawk pioneer picnic and pageant, the annual Hills family reunion and picnic at Jasper, and the I. O. O. F. sectional picnic gathering at Lost Creek ranch, were the three larger ones for the day.

Hundreds attended the Mohawk pioneer gathering. A large number of Eugene pioneers attended the event and came home high in praise of the pageant which featured the afternoon's program. The date for next year's picnic will probably come on the second Sunday of July, it was said Monday.

About 100 persons attended the Hills family reunion for descendants of Cornelius Hills, pioneer of 1847. It was mainly a "visit fest," with baseball games as the only special entertainment. The major games included the one between Dinty's and Hills Creek, Dinty's winning, 5 to 0; and that between the Crow and Hills Creek juniors, the Crow boys winning. Mrs. Hazel Norris of Jasper and Mrs. C. A. Huntington of Eugene were re-elected the joint chairmen of the organization. The picnic next year will come on the third Sunday of July again. Cornelius Hills crossed the plains three times. He came originally from New York, but it is not known definitely from what state he came to Oregon. He crossed the plains first in 1847, then returned over them in 1848 to be married, then back to Oregon again.

Between 1200 and 1500 are said to have attended the sectional picnic for the I. O. O. F. lodge at Lost Creek ranch. Members of the order came from Bend, Redmond, Prineville and several other sections in eastern Oregon, as well as from all parts of the Willamette valley. George P. Winslow, grand master of the Oregon lodge, was among the honor guests at the picnic, as was Charles P. Poole of Eugene, deputy grand master. The local I. O. O. F. band played. Sports and various contests featured the picnic. The westside team won the ball game, 9 to 7. Officers were re-elected, headed by Albert Julian of Redmond as president.

Several picnics were held in the park back of the butte.
