Close reiterated that far from being able to comply with the reported extortion demand for \$12,000, the Anti-Labor League, formerly known as the Anti-Saloon league, has insufficient money to carry on the work in opposition to repeal.

pointed out that the only way to make such a project self-liquidating would be to charge a small sewer rental.

The project, however, drew the endorsement of the meeting providing it proved feasible. The committee also endorsed a proposal to build a city natatorium at Riverview park, estimated to cost \$35,000, by placing it on a self-liquidating basis and receiving a federal loan for the construction.

In urging that Eugene get into the public works program, Earl M. Drew, president of the building congress, pointed out that Eugene taxpayers would pay off their share of the national appropriation for public works through taxes and he urged that Eugene share in the benefits of the program.

"The government makes an outright gift of 30 per cent of the cost to the city and takes a first mortgage on the project as collateral for the loan of the remaining 70 per cent," he pointed out.

Irvine, treasurer, E. C. Sammons and Irvine were named members of the executive committee to serve with the president and vice-president.

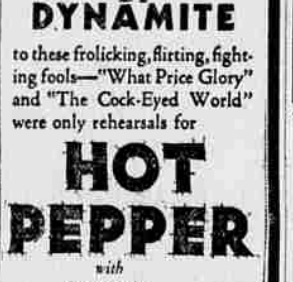

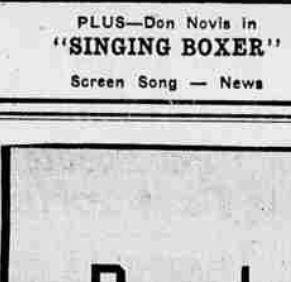
