

GILL TALKS AT GOLDSON MEETING

GOLDSON, July 19.—(Special).—State Grange Master Ray W. Gill of Portland addressed a representative audience at the Low Pass community hall near Goldson, Saturday evening, July 15, discussing the various measures to be voted upon at the special election, July 21. He explained the grange power bill and urged an affirmative vote for the state power fund bonds \$10 X, saying "Oregon needs this legislation now more than ever, for President Roosevelt has given encouragement to developing power and navigation on the Columbia river. One of the first steps by the government will be to ascertain the amount of the market available for power. The state power act mentioned will provide for the state building transmission lines to deliver this cheap power to the people, thereby creating a larger market."

Mr. Gill condemned the debt and taxation limitations amendment, saying, "It provides that no bond issue shall be voted except by a two-thirds vote—under such a law one-third of the people could kill the will of the majority. We believe that the majority should control."

In discussing the sales tax Mr. Gill stressed among others the fact that its enactment would result in a reduction of local business and an increase in mail order business, as outside dealers could sell in Oregon without paying a tax.

Local Man 2nd In National Contest

statement, "were given careful consideration and were approved subject to some minor changes suggested by the department of justice and the secretary of agriculture."

"The forms with the suggested changes are in the possession of General Johnson and will be given out by him."

Johnson confirmed that this referred to the blanket code program, but warned that it had to have formal presidential sanction before the program could proceed.

He has indicated that separate types of agreement have been drawn up for manufacturing industries, business and trade organizations.

Electrical Shipping Codes Up
These agreements are to be in effect temporarily until the more deliberate process of passing upon and promulgation individual codes for each line of business can be carried out.

Johnson's hope is that the blanket plan will give an immediate huge lift to the purchasing power of the country's working masses so as to absorb a sustained large industrial production and keep up with the advance in price levels.

While the cabinet board was in session, several more individual industrial codes were being considered at public hearings before deputy industrial administrators, these including the electrical and shipbuilding industries.

Exceptions Asked
At a hearing in the house office building, electrical manufacturers testified application of their proposed code would restore the full 1929 employment level in the industry upon a return of only 60 per cent of that year's production.

Clarence L. Collins, president of the Reliance Electrical Engineering company, of Cleveland, Ohio, gave these figures in endorsing the proposed 35 cents an hour minimum wage and a 36 hour week in the agreement.

Appearing at the department hearing, the shipbuilding people substituted a revision for their first code—a major change being that all employees engaged in designing, engineering, and other occupations preparatory to starting new work, such as the pending naval construction program, shall be exempt for six months from the 40-hour week proposed for the bulk of the employees.

Also the 40-hour week was changed to make it based on a six months period with provision that if any worker was employed more than eight hours in any one day he should receive time and a half for the overtime. Exception to the overtime provision was for the Great Lakes area during the navigating season.

The minimum pay for labor was left unchanged at 35 cents a sixth and 40 cents in the north.

Poultry Meetings Are Held In Lane

Two poultry meetings were held in Lane county the first of this week for the purpose of demonstrating vaccination against fowl pox. A total attendance of 60 poultry growers was reported by O. S. Fletcher, county agent, who had charge of the meetings.

The first meeting was held Monday on the Krenk brothers farm near Junction City and the second meeting was Tuesday on the H. L. Wood farm on Eugene road 2, near Goshen.

At the meetings, vaccination of chickens was demonstrated and growers were urged to vaccinate young chickens in cases where the fowl pox had been found on the place.

ing been cut sharply to three hours and 24 minutes. Wiley Post zoomed out of Iktusk today towards Blagoveshchensk, nearly 1,000 miles eastward, on the sixth lap of his world flight.

The American airman hopped off at 7 a. m. Moscow time (8 p. m. Tuesday, P. S. T.), after remaining here since 3:35 p. m. (4:35 a. m. P. S. T.) while his advantage over the time recorded by him and Harold Gatty two years ago was whittled to a slim margin.

Bad weather, which caused him to lose precious hours on the jaunt from Moscow to Novosibirsk, again dogged him, and forced him to stay here longer than he wanted to.

He still had unfavorable conditions before him, however, but he announced he would land at Blagoveshchensk—where he and Gatty suffered a mishap on the earlier flight—which lies between the Valonovoi and Sikhoto mountain ranges.

When he landed here from Novosibirsk he was 16 hours and 34 minutes ahead of his previous mark.
