WASHINGTON, July 20.—(AP)—

Wages—\$14 a week minimum
ranging from 45 cents to \$1
an hour for skilled and piece
work employees.
Hours—A 40-hour work week.
Labor—Child labor prohibited.

JUNCTION CITY, July 20.—(Special)—The Twin Oaks Lumber company in this city was entered some time Wednesday night, and \$40 worth of merchandise was stolen. Entrance had apparently been gained by break-

ing the glass from a rear door.
Some of the stolen goods were recovered by police Thursday morning in a vacant lot about a block from the company, indicating that the thieves had been frightened by something and forced to abandon part of their loot. Among the recovered included a portable typewriter, a quantity of 22 rifle shells, and numerous small articles.
