WINE AND WAR

EUGENE, Ore.—(To the Editor)—Neighbors, who are the men that the distillers have head the repeal movement and who have paid for one-half the propaganda that you have heard for practically eleven years? Three brothers, Irene, Lamont and Pierre Dupont. These men make war materials and sell them to warring nations. These men are tax dodgers in the sense that they can get you to pay part of their corporation taxes if you repeal the prohibition laws of your state and nation. ON SALES TAX

EUGENE, Ore.—(To the Editor)—It was interesting to me to read the various comments giving the ideas of various local citizens upon the proposed sales tax measure.
As many know, I have been rather active in supporting this measure because, though I think the bill might have been greatly improved upon in some of its provisions, especially those making me, as a professional man, pay a tax upon my earnings, (and this would be a purely selfish viewpoint), yet, I support the measure because, in my opinion, it will meet the emergency with which the state, counties, cities and schools are confronted, and further, that the principle of a sales tax is, after all, the fairest form of taxation.

I cannot see that the poor man is unjustly affected by this law. If he can only spend \$25.00 per month for necessities, his sales tax would be fifty cents. If he has no greater income, and if he has no other taxable property, surely he should not seriously complain in paying only \$0.00 per annum for enjoying the benefits of organized government. If his income will permit, and if he so desires, he can, of course, pay more—less tax by spending more money for necessities and other purchases. That is for him alone to determine.
Probably most families, including the wealthiest, do not spend for taxable necessities to exceed \$100.00 per month, two per cent of which is \$24 per annum.
Most farmers do not spend over two or three hundred dollars per annum for food and clothing, together with possibly \$300.00 per annum for necessary tools and machinery. That would make a farmer pay \$10.00 per annum sales tax. How does that compare, Mr. Farmer, with your present personal property tax which this law would abolish?

FORESEEN TROUBLE

EUGENE, Ore.—(To the Editor)—Man is a strange creature when he thinks that he is getting something for nothing. A railroad company had a plot of ground that they wanted dug up very fine, so they planted a few gold coins and invited the public to come and hunt for them. The ground was dug up and pulverized, the suckers got the coins, the railroad got their money back in car fares and their ground worked free, and the poor devils thought that they got something for nothing.
On Friday we are asked to vote on getting something for nothing; revenue from the sale of liquor by repealing the 18th amendment. I have been watching this matter from a philosophical viewpoint.
