

RAILROADS, MILLS SHOW ACTIVITY IN AREA ABOUT GROVE

COTTAGE GROVE, July 21.—(Special)—If railroad activity is an indication of prosperity, Cottage Grove should be coming in for its share, for the Oregon Pacific & Eastern railway, which serves the Row River valley, has more business than for several years. This is due to activity in the lumber business.

Years ago several large mills were in operation on this line and two mills in the city were served with logs that came over the line. As timber tracts were cut out the mills were closed, then the bottom dropped out of the lumber market. There are yet great tracts of timber tributary to the railroad and now the Bohemia Lumber company, with a new mill, is in full operation at Culp Creek and the Scott mill, to be operated under the name of the Walden Lumber company, and owned by Eastburn Bros., who came here from Junction City, is expected to go into operation next Monday at Walden. An old mill at this location has been inactive for many years.

The Anderson & Middleton Lumber company, in the hands of receivers, has a contract to cut 400,000,000 feet of government timber near Layne Creek ranger station and several years ago spent a large sum of money preparing a millsite near Dorena and building a railway into the timber. There have been rumors that the owners of this company are nearly cut out on Puget Sound and contemplated operations here, but no direct word has been received here. This company also owns large tracts of timber near its millsite.

Repairs to roadbed and bridges are being made by the railway. The city's only other railway, owned by J. H. Chambers and Son, is active in handling logs for the Chambers mill located in this city. This is not a common carrier but the O. P. & E. is.

The second annual homemakers camp, sponsored by the Lane county homemakers organization and directed by Miss Gertrude Skow, home demonstration agent, will start July 30 this year, running till August 3, at the Girl Scouts camp, Miss Skow announced Friday.

About 30 women are expected to attend the camp this year for the period of rest, recreation and inspiration. Registrations must be in by Wednesday, July 23. Cost of the camp is \$2.50 plus a bag of vegetables or fruits.

With Miss Skow as leaders of the camp will be Harriett Lang, state librarian, who will lead book discussions; Ruth Middelkauff, head of applied art at Oregon State college; and Margery Thayer, swimming instructor at the University of Oregon.

There will be a cook with two assistants, thus assuring the women who attend that they will not have to do their own cooking or any of the dish washing, Miss Skow declared.

Last year the Lane county homemakers' camp was the first camp of the sort in the state. This year other counties of the state are adopting the idea.
