Man rather than actual legal authority.

Also it is considered likely that the group to be formed here will be given charge of the campaign throughout Lane county or at least with the formation of effective cooperating groups in other cities within the county.

Text of Request

The text of the message from General Johnson follows:

"Will you take the initiative immediately in organizing a campaign committee in your community to be composed of the mayor, the official heads of the chamber of commerce, clearing house association, Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions, retail merchants, federation of labor, advertising clubs, federation of women's clubs, welfare societies, ministerial association, real estate association and any other civic organization which in your judgment is representative of an important element in the economic life of your community.

"The function of this committee is to direct a campaign of education and organization which is to be part of a national movement to speed the return of prosperity through the expansion of consumer purchasing power in accordance with the principles set forth in the national recovery act.

"I will communicate with you covering the further steps in this campaign upon receipt of your reply.

"It is an inspiring thing to be a part of our great national movement to restore economic security to our people and I appeal to you to marshal all the forces of your community in one united effort to get rid of unemployment.

"Hugh S. Johnson, administrator National Recovery."

Reply of Mr. Morris

To this Mr. Morris immediately made the following reply:

"I will be glad to co-operate in national recovery by organizing committee as requested in your wire. Am waiting further information.

"Edward H. Morris, president Eugene Chamber of Commerce."

Mayor is Ready

"Count on me to help in every way possible," said Mayor Eliza Large when he heard about the message.

All other civic leaders made similar expressions.

Mr. Morris says that as soon as he receives more detailed instructions, he will call a meeting of the various people suggested and that he will include in the call such others as he deems advisable.

Much work has already been done toward organizing local industrial and business concerns. Bakers, meat dealers, grocers, lumbermen, retailers, cannery and many other groups either have formed trade agreements or have them in process of formation. With some of the groups, the organization is state-wide in form. With others it is still purely local.

It is expected that the leadership group here will be asked to take two steps:

1.—Application of the president's provisional code.

2.—Speeding up of the more permanent agreements.

It may be that the group will also be asked to co-ordinate and speed up the various public works projects such as road building and the proposed sewage disposal plant and the new buildings at the University campus which are now being promoted under separate auspices.

It is believed the detailed instructions from Washington may be received in time to hold the first group meeting by Monday.

GRAIN PITS CLOSED

The grain trade drew a long breath and relaxed as trading was suspended at all the principal American exchanges to allow rest from the violent sessions which culminated yesterday in the worst price collapse in many years.

Following the action of the Chicago Board of Trade in suspending dealings for the day, Kansas City, Minneapolis, St. Louis and Duluth were quick to fall in line and take a holiday. When trading resumed tomorrow there will be limits on daily fluctuations.

Cash Sales Light

The action taken by directors of the Chicago Board of Trade late last night caused but little surprise. The reason given for the suspension of trading was that tired employees needed some rest, but veteran observers saw it as a means of checking the frenzy which characterized transactions late yesterday. Then what dropped upwards of 17 cents, rye 26 and other grains in proportion.

Although it was a holiday in the pits, hundreds of traders circled uneasily around the vast trading floor of the Chicago exchange with huge crowds in the gallery watching curiously. The comparative quiet of the trading floor was in strange contrast with the uproar that usually prevails. Brokers clerks worked many hours checking their records.

A few transactions were taken care of in the cash market, mainly business that had to be cleared on newly arrived shipments.

F. D. NOT BOTHERED

Aaron Frank Here To Fish McKenzie

Aaron Frank, prominent Portland merchant and civic leader, will fish the McKenzie for the next three or four days, he announced Friday when he stepped in Eugene for supplies.

Mr. Frank, with Mrs. Frank and their two sons, Richard and Jerry, left Eugene Friday afternoon for Thom's resort where they will make their headquarters for the trip. The party left Portland three weeks ago, going to San Francisco over the Oregon coast highway.

Utilities Group Granted Extra Sum

SALEM, July 21.—(AP)—The state emergency board voted unanimously here yesterday to authorize utilities commissioner C. M. Thomas to expend \$27,300 in excess of his legislative appropriation during 1933.

The added expenditure will be for rate and charges investigations and will be assessed against all the utilities of Oregon, based on their gross revenues, as provided by a new legislative act.

vote for repeal. Dry organizations said they believed they had "a fighting chance."

The polls opened at 8 a. m. for a popular vote on the 18th amendment and the remaining "constitutional" prohibition statutes of the state. Last November by a vote of 208,019 to 138,775 the enforcing acts of state prohibition were repealed. This, in fact, nullified the "constitutional" prohibitions which remained.

The election of 116 delegates to a constitutional convention on repeal of the 18th amendment was only an incident of the balloting. The state required of each candidate a pledge that he would vote at the convention, wet or dry, as his county voted. The delegates will have no discretion at the convention, which probably will be held within 30 days.

Count to Be Slow
Light balloting was predicted by state election officials. Out of a total registration of 444,000, possibly not

more than 250,000 would vote at the polls, they said. The vast majority of the voters were expected to be responsible. Although both sides use of considerable advertising oratory the voters did not seem greatly exercised. The balloting was to be slow inasmuch as the decision as to whether to abolish double election was made.

Early reports from Portland precincts today indicated a tie for voting trend than had been expected for forenoon, and a 10 per cent of the registered voters had cast at mid-morning to information from several precincts.

There was no day counting in Multnomah county's 640 precincts except at 27 polling places. At the others it was held at 8 p. m., when the polls closed.
