

STEELE RETURNS FROM INSPECTION

Foster Steele, assistant supervisor with the Willamette forest headquarters here, has returned from a trip of inspection of some of the projects being done at the Belknap 3-C camp on the McKenzie.

Mr. Steele reports good progress in the work being done by the camp on two road construction projects, one leading towards Clear Lake, the other on Horse creek, and also on construction of buildings and maintenance work on the Box Canyon road.

The Box Canyon road is the connecting link between the Willamette and McKenzie highways, running about 60 miles. The Belknap camp group is now at Dutch Oven on this work and Monday will move their road camp to Friswell crossing.

It will be around the first of August before the road is open to travel all the way through.

Snow is rapidly disappearing, although there is more than normally for this season of the year in the mountains. Mr. Steele reports. Workers are not yet able to get into Indian Ridge and substitute lookouts because of the snow.

ALBANY, N. Y., July 21.—(AP)—Breaking his silence for the first time, Ed O'Connell, uncle of John J. O'Connell, Jr., today said a ransom had not been paid for the kidnapped boy.

The elder O'Connell, democratic power up state, since the youth was kidnapped two weeks ago has refused to discuss the case with either authorities or the press.

Today he answered a series of questions.

He said the family had had no contact with the kidnapers beyond advertisements in Albany and New York papers. He believed the boy was safe but that was based on "just a feeling."

The present status of the abduction case, he declared, was one of "waiting for news."
