PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—(AP)—An Oregon grandstand today echoed to the roar of "they're off!" as legalized horse racing came to this state for the first time since 1900.

The 26-day meeting under the promotion of William P. Kyne opened at the Graham track near Portland with eight races on the program and the highest class of thoroughbreds ever stabled in this section listed for action over the new five-eighths mile oval.

Two Portland Banks to Open Albany Branches

PORTLAND, July 21.—(AP)—Two Portland banks today confirmed previous reports that they will establish branches in Albany. Charters have been received and the branches may be opened by the first of next week.

Paul S. Dick, president of the United States National, and E. B. MacNaughton, president of the First National here, each said that selection of a location in Albany would be made quickly. Each bank probably will send a man from Portland as manager. Each will have an assistant long connected with the Albany banking business.

One bank at Albany is in the hands of a conservator, and the other has paid 5 per cent on its commercial deposits and 10 per cent to its savings depositors since it was closed. The Lima county capital has not had unrestricted banking operation since the March bank holiday.
