

PITCHERS ANNOYED BY ASSAULT FROM RECORD BREAKERS

Perhaps faked by publicity accorded young Joe DeMaggio of the Seals, who hit in his 57th consecutive game, and Jimmie Foxx of the Athletics, who hit in his 42nd game, pitchers stepped into the limelight of the Pacific Coast league Friday night.

Ulrich of Seattle, lost a 4 to 2 decision to Hollywood, under the arc lights. Annoyed, he pitched the entire second game, too, and won it, 5 to 4.

The league leading Sacramento club put down an 8th inning rally by San Francisco to eke out a 7 to 6 victory. Zinn of the Seals and Vinci of the Senators yielded nine hits each.

DeMaggio, nearing the world mark for hitting in consecutive games, added his 57th by a hair-breadth when he beat out a drive to shortstop.

AUGUST 14 PROBABLE

SALEM, July 22.—(AP)—The date of the state constitutional convention will probably be August 14. It was indicated at the governor's offices here today. The convention will record the vote of Oregon for repeal with the 116 delegates in session.

The law calling for the convention directed the governor to call the meeting within 30 days after the official canvass of the votes has been made. This will probably take about 10 days. The convention then must be held during the month of August. It was believed the governor would set the date some time next week without waiting for the official canvass.

Bonus Change Wins
Except for the change in the soldier's bonus law, which was sponsored by the soldiers' aid commission, all other proposed measures were defeated.

The proposed tax on oleomargarine, without which no election in Oregon in recent years has been complete, was swamped under an overwhelming negative vote.

to work for legislation to the interests of the lumber industry; and to further the use of wood products.

J. E. Mackie, structural engineer and representative of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association in Portland, was the second speaker to score the highway department's plan for concrete bridges.

The attitude of the highway department is unfair. Furthermore, the design of the bridges, as to location and type, has made it impossible to use lumber. This plan is wrong, he declared. He pointed out that lumber used properly, is a building material of economic permanence.

Two sides on the bus and truck bill were presented for the meeting. Ralph J. Staehl of the Allied Truck Owners, Inc. declared the act should be permitted to go on and be changed when the opportunity came and occasion arose. Too much misinformation has been given out regarding the bill, Mr. Staehl said a code was to be drawn up soon for truck operators in the logging and lumber industry, tending to regulate hours and wages.

The Eugene members of a life group are expected to hold a meeting on this matter soon.

A. C. Anderson of the Truck Owners and Farmers' Protective association, Salem, said the act was wrong, was class legislation, and that the matter would soon come up to decision. If the circuit court fails to act, the matter will go to the supreme court, Mr. Anderson said. If a special session of the legislature is called the matter may come up then instead of going to the supreme court.
