They meet, possibly by chance, possibly by the guiding hand of fate, and each one begins to think controls them. During the six days of the voyage, every human emotion from hate to love; every type of event in a human life, from birth to death, takes place aboard the vessel.

Ronald Colman, star of a long line of Samuel Goldwyn screen successes, comes to the Colonial Sunday in "Cynara," his latest and in the opinion of his friends, his best. The picture was directed by King Vidor. As was the case with "Arrowsmith," his last picture, Colman trends new ground in "Cynara." It was largely because of the sense of contrast, as a matter of fact, that Mr. Goldwyn selected the story, and it was just as much of a contrast to Director Vidor too, for this is his initial effort in urbanity and sophistication. In support of Colman, Kay Francis portrays the role of the young wife, and an actress new to the screen, Phyllis Barry, is the other woman. The film will close Tuesday.

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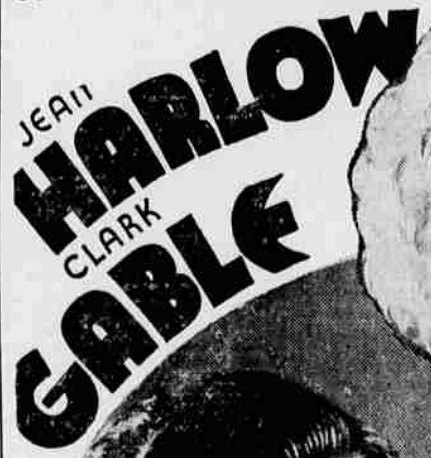
