Obituaries

Mrs. Myra V. Elgin

Mrs. Myra V. Elgin died at her home in Eugene early Sunday morning at the age of 81 years.

Mrs. Elgin was born June 22, 1852, in Franklin, Ind. Her parents being Colonel Samuel and Elizabeth Lambertson. On June 29, 1875, she was united in marriage to Rev. G. H. Elgin, D. D. Dr. Elgin died in Southport, Ind., in May, 1890, after an extensive and successful ministry both as a pastor and as a Baptist leader in the middle west and east. For some time after her husband's death, Mrs. Elgin carried on the work of the church until another pastor was called. Mrs. Elgin was also widely known having traveled for some time in the interest of one of the national Baptist mission boards of which she became a life member. She was active in various forms of church work, serving as church organist for about 35 years.

Mrs. Elgin is survived by two children with whom she resided: Miss Rowena Maude Elgin and Dr. W. W. Elgin. She is also survived by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. W. W. Elgin of Eugene; two sisters, Mrs. U. M. Chaille of Royal Oak, Mich., and Mrs. Dora LaVie of Washington, D. C.; other relatives and a host of friends. Two brothers, Attorney Genio M. Lambertson and Dr. Orin F. Lambertson, well known attorney and doctor of Lincoln, Neb., preceded her in death. Mrs. Elgin came to Eugene from Detroit, Mich., in April, 1928, having lived in Detroit for 16 years. She was a member of the Eugene Baptist church.

The body is being taken to Franklin, Ind., for burial and will be accompanied by the daughter, Miss Maude Elgin.

Mrs. Dow Wilson

Mrs. Dow Wilson, formerly Gladys Anderson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Anderson of this city, died Sunday morning at Portland following an illness of several weeks.

Mrs. Wilson was 31 years of age, born at Morris, Minn., Feb. 11, 1902. She came to Eugene in 1912. She graduated from the University of Oregon with the class of 1924 and was a member of Alpha Phi sorority on the campus. She was a member of the Presbyterian church.

County Cannery Here This Week

SPRINGFIELD, July 24.—(Special).—The county cannery will make its first visit to Springfield Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, according to the schedule worked out by Commissioner O. E. Crowe. It will be located at Sixth and Main streets during its stay here.

Persons having fruits or vegetables to be canned but lacking the canning apparatus may bring them to the cannery where they will be put up. It is necessary that all persons planning to do this register at the city hall with I. M. Peterson, in order that an estimate of the amount of canning to be done may be given the cannery officials.

While the cannery is here this time chiefly vegetables will be put up, according to Miss Rowena Nisson, Red Cross representative. The cannery is to visit Springfield again August 21 and 22 and September 5 and 6. Peas and beans should not be washed before they are brought to the cannery, and beans should be cut to one-inch lengths, in order to

be packed better. Miss Nisson reported. Carrots and beets are to be pre-cooked. Those having fruits or vegetables to be canned are asked to bring them in the morning, although the canning will go on all day.

The county reserves a certain number of cans from each dozen for distribution to persons on relief during the winter, and in this way partially pays for the cannery.

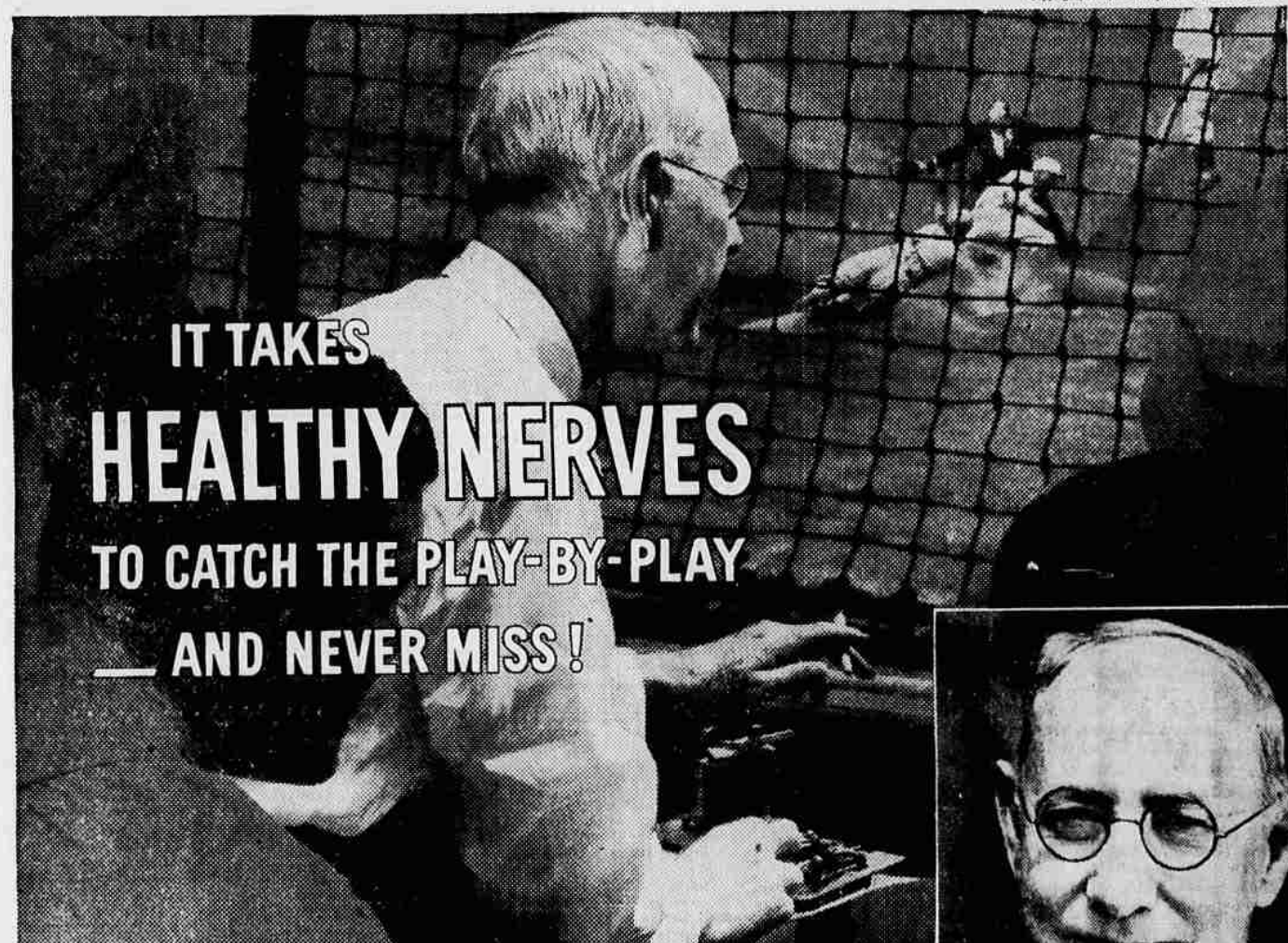
